Winnipeg Grain
Winnipeg, July 10.—Trading was more active on the wheat market, and options opened unchanged to 3-8 higher on the contract and Liverpool cables. The latter market opened 3-8 to 5-8 cents higher and closed 1-8 to 5-8 higher. American markets were also strong at opening and advanced during the session.

Following the opening of Winnipeg market, there was considerable fluctuation, particularly in July, due to shorts covering and an improved demand, while near the close there were high figures of the day. July closed 3-4 to 1-2 cents higher.
The cash demand was fairly good for all grades, while offerings were not abundant and prices higher: feed wheat advanced 2-1-2 cents.
