HOW U. S. WILL CHECK
CHILD LABOR IN
MANUFACTURING

May Deny Transport of Goods Between States to Concerns Which Employ Children Under Certain Ages; Bill Introduced Into Commons

New York, June 17.—A comprehensive plan for federal prohibition of child labor will be proposed in a bill to be introduced in the house of representatives in Washington by Representative Frank P. Rowland of Illinois, it was announced by the progressive party national service here tonight.

The bill is based on the principles of former Senator Beveridge's original proposal in 1907, denying the right of interstate transportation to the products of child labor.

Manufacturers, producers, interstate carriers, jobbers and wholesalers are made responsible for unlawful shipments.

By a provision of the bill similar to that of the pure food and drugs act, commerce remains after to be stamped or labeled "Registered under the federal child labor act."

The employment of a child under 14 years of age in any mill, factory, cannery, workshop, manufacturing or mechanical establishment, or in any other place where the child is employed in any way, is prohibited.

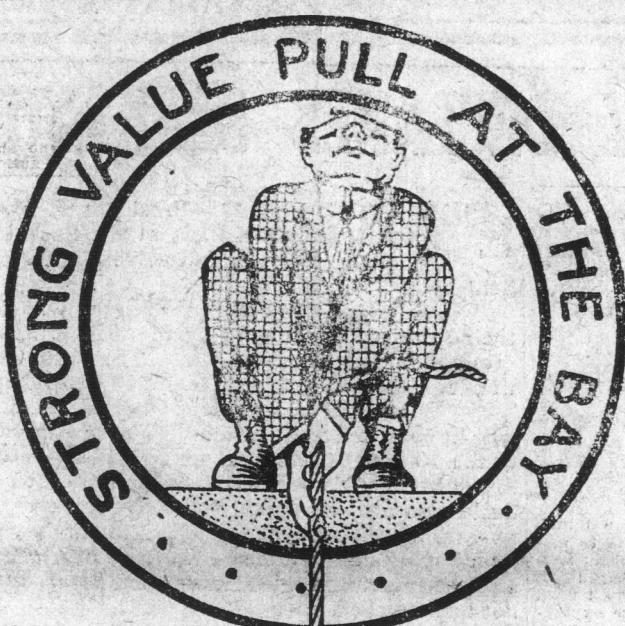

State of Kansas Has Its Own Way of Coping With Problems

Topeka, Kan., June 15.—Through the teaching of domestic science in the home Kansas gained a million dollars last year, and the amount will be increased at the rate of half a million dollars a year until practically there will be no waste food in the entire state. This is the aim of the agricultural college, and the state is spending \$40,000 a year to help in educating the girls.

Seven hundred girls completed the domestic science course at the agricultural college last week, and the college just closed its movable cooking schools, which were attended by 11,000 women during the 10 weeks which they were operated.

Kansas decided two years ago the way to cut the high cost of living was out of kitchen doors and into the garbage can. One of the plans was the movable cooking schools and the other was high school domestic science work.

The Extension of the Suffrage
In Illinois Will Have
Such Results

Chicago, June 17.—Woman suffrage in Illinois means Chicago will go dry within 10 years.

This was the message flashed out to its co-workers by the Cook county central committee of the Prohibition party following its bi-monthly meeting. The committee, which is evenly divided between men and women, was elected over the women's victory in the legislature.

"Now that women will soon have the right to vote we expect to remove the main obstacle in Chicago," said Mary J. Goss, secretary of the committee. "We had always figured that the territory outside of Chicago would slowly but surely come into the dry column regardless of women's votes."

All factions, including the liquor forces, admit that giving the vote to women will create havoc with saloons in small towns down state. It is estimated that they will be wiped out at the rate of 2,000 a year.
