Berlin, April 15—The Minister of Foreign Affairs, Baron von Buelow, announced in the Reichstag yesterday that an agreement had been arrived at with Great Britain with regard to sending acommission to Samoa.

Washington, April 15.—After hearing yesterday morning from the British and German embassies, the State Department was enabled to announce positively and finally that the three parties to the Berlin treaty had agreed upon the instructions to be given their Samoan commissioners, and that it was certain that the commission would leave San Francisco on the 25th inst. for Samoa on board the Badger.




