#### COMMISSION A FACT.

The Three Governments Give Out Commemorative News and Commission Will Sail on the 25th.

London, April 15.—The officials of the British Foreign Office say that the Marquis of Salisbury has agreed that the decisions regarding the provisional measures to be taken in keeping order in Samoa will be observed. They add that the functions of the commissioners will be to strive to agree to the measures necessary for a peaceful solution of the difficulties, but the conclusions they individually reach will of course be sent to their respective Governments, between whom further negotiations will then occur in regard to the final settlement.

The Parliamentary Secretary of the Foreign Office, Right Hon. St. John Broderick, replying in the House of Commons to questions yesterday, said information had reached the Foreign Office of the trouble in Samoa, and said arrangements had been made by the three Governments to send a commission with full powers to act for the restoration of order with respect to the steps necessary for the future government of the islands.

Berlin, April 15.—The Minister of Foreign Affairs, Baron von Bulow, announced in the Reichstag yesterday that an agreement had been arrived at with Great Britain with regard to sending a commission to Samoa.

Washington, April 15.—After hearing yesterday morning from the British and German embassies, the State Department was enabled to announce positively and finally that the three parties to the Berlin treaty had agreed upon the instructions to be given their Samoan commissioners, and that it was certain that the commission would leave San Francisco on the 25th inst. for Samoa on board the Badger.

#### FINLANDERS STAMPEDE.

Great Rush of the Younger Generation to Get Away From Russian Cruelty.

Hull, Eng., April 14.—There is a great rush of young Finlanders for America to avoid the recent decree of Emperor Nicholas regarding Finland, which provides for an increase of the Russian military and naval forces, and the extension of conscription. The steamer Arcturus landed 315 men here yesterday from Hangö; 302 arrived a few days ago, and all report that many more are coming as soon as possible.

#### FINNISH PATRIOTS REVOLT.

Moscow Gazette Correspondent Cannot Get a Place to Live In.

Helsingfors, April 17.—The Finnish patriots are now in open revolt against the new regime, which aims to rob them of their national life and Russinize the entire province.

Messaroch, the local correspondent of the Moscow Gazette, whose incessant and systematic attacks on Finland, her people and her institutions, have evoked great resentment, is subjected to a most complete boycott at the present time. The keepers of restaurants and shops refuse to serve him. He is insulted in the streets, and he has been turned out of his lodgings by a patriotic landlord.

The ostracized correspondent has been compelled to seek shelter in the barracks of the First Rifle Regiment, having failed to induce any lodging-house keeper to take him in.

#### THE ELECTIONS IN SPAIN.

They Passed Off Quietly—Some Diplomatic Appointments Made.

Madrid, April 17.—The elections to the new Cortes passed off quietly in Madrid yesterday. Some disturbances occurred at Bilbao and many persons were injured at Valencia and at Cullar de Baza in Andalusia. At Granada an election agent was murdered.

The Official Gazette yesterday contains a royal decree appointing the Duke of Arcos to be Spanish envoy extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary to the United States. The decree also creates consuls at Havana, Manila, Iloilo, San Juan de Porto Rico and Cienfuegos.

Senor Larrea, now Spanish consul at Antwerp, is transferred to Havana, Senor Bouilla, now at Shanghai, is appointed to Manila, and Senor Uriarte goes to Antwerp.

In consequence of a bull fight here, only about one-third of the electors of the city went to the polls. The elections seem favorable to the Government.

#### Around the World in 33 Days.

London, April 17.—The Russian Minister of Railways, it is announced in a special despatch from St. Petersburg, says that when the Trans-Siberian Railroad is completed it will be possible to go around the world in 33 days, as follows: Bremen to St. Petersburg, one and a half days; St. Petersburg to Vladivostok, ten days; Vladivostok to San Francisco by steamer, ten days; San Francisco to New York, 4½ days; New York to Bremen, seven days. Total, 33 days.

#### Trouble in China.

Hongkong, April 17.—The villagers of Taipeest, one of the newly-acquired places in the British territory on the Hongkong mainland, rebelled on Saturday and burned some British mat sheds. They are now armed and occupy the hills. Troops have been sent to quell the disturbance.

#### Duchess of Marlborough Dead.

London, April 17.—Lady Frances Anne Emily, Duchess of Marlborough, daughter of the third Marquis of Londonderry, and widow of the seventh Duke of Marlborough, died suddenly yesterday morning of bronchial catarrh.

#### Warning to the Toy Trade.

Berlin, April 17.—The Prussian Minister of Commerce has issued a warning to the toy trade to prepare for a total or partial prohibition against German toys by the American Government, on the ground that they are covered with poisonous paints.

#### Earthquakes in Greece.

Athens, April 17.—Violent earthquakes occurred on Saturday in Peloponnesus, a peninsula in the south portion of Greece. Many houses collapsed at Gassoni and elsewhere, but no fatalities have been reported.

#### SUICIDE BY DROWNING.

A Howick Farmer's Rash Act While Temporarily Insane.

Gorrie, Ont., April 17.—A sad calamity took place yesterday morning, when George Saunders, who resided about five miles from Gorrie, on the 12th concession of Howick, committed suicide by drowning himself in the north branch of the River Madan, about 80 rods from his father's farm. It is believed that he has been temporarily insane for some time, and when his friends missed him, on searching, they noticed foot marks in last night's fall of snow and traced them to the bank. On making diligent search they recovered the body.

#### Little Girl Burned to Death.

Cornwall, April 15.—While playing in their father's sugar bush and boiling down sugar, Esdras Maroux, the 5-year-old daughter of a farmer living near Alexandria, was burned to death. Sparks from the fire caught in the child's apron and she was soon enveloped in flames. Her young sister, in endeavoring to extinguish the flames, was terribly burned, and it is feared she will lose both her hands.

#### Serious Charge Against John Devlin.

Woodstock, April 17.—John Devlin of Tilsonburg lies in the jail here with a serious charge registered against him. Dora Crossett, a 17-year-old Tilsonburg girl, charges that Devlin seduced her under promise of marriage over a year ago. Saturday morning another charge was laid before Magistrate Field against Devlin, in that he seduced the girl while she was under 16 years of age.

#### Chatham Boy Drowned.

Chatham, Ont., April 17.—While playing on the sheet piling near the Mever House, St. Clair flats, Clifford Bradley, the 4-year-old son of George Bradley of Port Lambton, slipped and fell on the moving ice and from the ice slipped into the water and was drowned. His body has not yet been recovered, and it will be very difficult to find, as the ice flow is too strong to permit dragging.


