Some of our contemporaries are serfously discussing a cock-and-bull story sent out from Toronto to the effect that Hon. Geo. W. Ross, Minister of Education, had in contemplation and was actively preparing for the intro- Scnsational Disclosure by duction of mechanical training into the public schools. On the assumption that the statement was correct, learned homilies have been penned on the foolishness of adding to the studies of boys in public schools. It turns out, however, that the report of innovations has no foundation. The Minister was seen by a reporter of the Toronto News, and this is his reply:

"There will be no revolution in our present methods. I do not think we are preparing to teach the mechanical trades in our schools. I am favorable to teaching cooking and plain sewing, as is done in some of the big cities in England, and I think that by thus educating the wives and daughters of mechanics we can perhaps benefit the echanics more than by teaching blacksmithing and carpentering in the schools. The addition of cooking and sewing classes is therefore the only improvement likely to be made."

RUSSIA READY FOR WAR. London, Sept. 22.-A dispatch from Sebastopol says that the Russian Black Sea fleet has been put on a war footing, and that three battalions of infantry have embarked. Part of the Russia are ready for active service.

AGITATION IN SPAIN. London, Sept. 22.-The Carlist agitation in Spain continues making headway slowly, and their organization is being perfected at every point. The Heraldo today publishes another interview with Don Carlos, the pretender to the throne of Spain, in which he is quoted as blaming the feeble ness of Spain's dealing with the United States, and declares that the situation is the same as that which preceded the revolution of 1868. In conclusion. Don Carlos is said to have repletery organized, disciplined and armed, and that they only await his word to rise against the Gov.

London, Sept. 22.-A dispatch from Constantinople says: Details received here regarding the massacre at Egin, in the vilayet of Kharput, show that it occurred on the 15th and 16th of the present month. The Kurds attacked the Armenian quarter, killed a large number of its inhabitants and pillaged and burned their houses. Many Ar-menians escaped to the mountains. According to the accounts of the Turkish Government, 600 Armenians were killed at Egin, and these advices also state that the outrage was provoked by the Armenians firing into the Turkish quarter. No authentic details of the massacre have yet been received. The Armenians of Egin escaped the massacres of 1895 by purchasing their security with money and produce. It is feared that the massacre is the beginning of a fresh series of massacres in Armenia, which was anticipated after the massacres which have just ended here.

A FIENDISH FATHER. London, Sept. 22.-A Berlin dispatch says: One of the most extraordinary results of drunken frenzy ever known in the country has just occurred in East Prussia. A farmer named Schlott, of Gemirre, while looking over his domain one morning last week, saw a lot of cattle coming through broken gate into his corn field. He hunted up his young son, who was in charge of that particular field, and upbraided him for not better attending to his duties. After inspecting the reception room, the royal party joined the Duchess of Buccleuch and the Countess of Lytton and embarked on the steamer Tantallon Castle. The steamer then proceeded down the firth to meet the Czar and Czarina. The Channel fleet, which lined the Firth of Forth, saluted as the Prince of Wales and the royal party traversed the lines. The Russian imperial yachts, on their arrival, were saluted by the fleet, and immediately dropped anchor. The Tantallon Castle soon afterwards ran alongside the Standard, the latter having their Russian Majesties on board and the Prince of Wales, the Duke of Connaught and M. De Staal went on board and welcomed the Czar and Czarina to Leith. The greetings exchanged between the imperial travelers and the British Princes was most

affectionate. The party afterwards lunched together on board the Standard. Though the weather was far from being all that could be wished for the reception, there was no mistaking the fact that the people of Leith and its vicinity had turned out in the fullest possible force, determined to give the imperial travelers a hearty and genuine welcome to the shores of Scotland. The whole harbor was full of merchant vessels from all parts of the world, and they were all decked from stem to stern with bunting, and placed in the neatest possible trim on both sides of the water, so that, after passing through the lines of powerful warships the progress of the Standard up the Firth of Forth was parade like in the

extreme. The precautions taken afloat for the protection of their majesties were unprecedented, it is believed, in naval annals.
