GALES, UNSETTLED, SNOW AT
NIGHT.

Toronto, Nov. 25-11 p.m.-The dis-
turbance which was developing in the Gulf
of Mexico last night is now centered over
Illinois as a storm of importance, and pre-
sents a high degree of danger to the coast.
The winds have increased to strong breezes and
gales from the eastward in Ontario and
Quebec, attended by snow and rain, and
the weather is now becoming unsettled in
the Maritime Provinces.

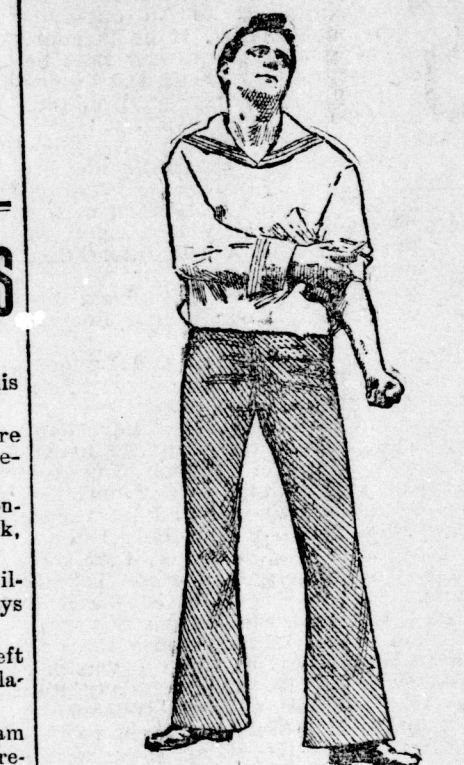
