DRIVING ROD BROKE And the Crash Threw Fireman Austin on the Coal,

Narrow Escape of a Fireman on the I. E. and D. R. Engine.

Every now and then narrow escapes are recorded of enginemen in connection with breaking driving rods. City railway men are talking about the narrow escape of Fireman Austin on the Lake Erie and Detroit River train on Saturday morning. The engine of this train came from Walkerville with the original train, and while not exactly new, has a good strong pull and a very healthy sound. Driver Porteous was handling the throttle on Saturday morning, and Fireman Austin was shoveling coal and plying the bell rope and whis-tle cord. The train was well filled, and while moving at a rapid rate near White's the two men on the engine heard a crack. Half a second later the floor of the tender under Mr. Austin's feet received a blow that raised him up and landed him backward several


