FAIR, VERY WARM, AND LOCAL THUNDER STORMS.

Toronto, June 2.—11 p.m.—Tonight the pressure is average or a little below normal, with a little below normal. Showers have occurred today in the Ottawa valley, Nova Scotia and Manitoba. The great heat continues in the Province of Ontario, and has today been felt all over a portion of the Maritime Provinces. In Manitoba and the Northwest the weather is cool.
The minimum and maximum temperatures reported for today are: Edmonton, 41—66; Calgary, 38—69; Prince Albert, 32—68; Winnipeg, 42—56; Toronto, 66—94; Kingston, 54—76; Montreal, 64—86; Quebec, 64—78; Halifax, 56—86; Chatham, N. B., 50—68.
Toronto, June 3.—1 a.m.—Probabilities for the next 24 hours covering the lake region and as far east as Belleville are: Winds mostly westerly and southerly; fair and very warm, with local thunder storms, more particularly in the northern portion.

—The L. E. and D. R. R. has secured the steamer R. G. Stuart for the Port Stanley-Cleveland excursion season of 1935. Commencing tomorrow, the Stuart will leave the Port at 11 p.m. on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.

—J. F. Reynett, of the G. T. R. freight department, Stratford, has been promoted to the place of chief biller in the company's office here. Mr. Reynett is a young man of sterling qualities, and will make a success of his new position.

DRIVING ROD BROKE
And the Crash Threw Fireman Austin on the Coal.

Narrow Escape of a Fireman on the I. E. and D. R. Engine.

Every now and then narrow escapes are recorded of enginemen in connection with breaking driving rods. City railway men are talking about the narrow escape of Fireman Austin on the Lake Erie and Detroit River train on Saturday morning. The engine of this train came from Walkerville with the original train, and while not exactly new, has a good strong pull and a very healthy sound. Driver Porteous was handling the throttle on Saturday morning, and Fireman Austin was shovelling coal and plying the bell rope at the cord. The train was well filled, and while moving at a rapid rate near White's the two men on the engine heard a crack. Half a second later the floor of the tender under Mr. Austin's feet received a blow that raised him up and landed him backward several feet on the coals. Then the broken rod, which had cracked near the wrist-pin, dragged, and as soon as possible the train was brought to a standstill. A delay occurred until a fresh engine could be secured from London. Had the break happened in a different portion of the rod, causing it to swing over and back, instead of under, it would have crashed through the cab with perhaps fatal results to Mr. Austin.
