MEETING OF BRITISH EMPIRE LEAGUE.

Resolution Approving the Conference of Premiers—Officers Chosen—Hon. J. I. Tarte, Col. Denison and Hon. G. Foster Among the Speakers.

Ottawa, Feb. 20.—The British Empire League in Canada met this morning in the committee room of the House of Commons, Col. George I. Denison, president, in the chair, and passed resolutions in reference to imperial defense and the cheaper postage rates throughout the empire.

The report of the executive committee expressed regret that no definite and successful step had been taken to establish a line on the Atlantic, and the hope that a naval reserve in Canada would be formed at the earliest possible moment. A government cable across the Atlantic, and the nationalization of the entire telegraph system was advocated, and well-considered imperial postage on newspapers and periodicals.

The following resolution, moved by Hon. J. I. Tarte, and seconded by Dr. Russell, of Nova Scotia, was adopted: "That this league views with profound satisfaction the proposal of the colonial secretary to hold a conference of imperial premiers in London on the occasion of the King's coronation, and deems it opportune at the present time to express its hope and confidence that the deliberations and resolves of the conference may tend to still further promote and safeguard those imperial and colonial interests which are of vital importance to every branch of the empire."

Mr. Tarte, in his address, said he thought Canada was better as part of the British Empire, and the best course was to work in line of harmony and help build up the greatest empire in the world. While admiring England, he was a French-Canadian, and proud of it, but he would beg of the majority, if the French-Canadians did not always manifest the same sympathies, not on that account to accuse them of disloyalty. It was not fair. Representation of Canada in parliament was not a live question today, but he could not see why the premier of Canada, or the minister of public works, would cut as good a figure in England as in Canada. Speaking of the cable communication, Mr. Tarte reminded the meeting that Canada was today dependent on New York for its pressable service, while to construct a line from Belle Isle, the present terminus of the Canadian Coastal Service, to connect with the Marconi system or an independent cable at Canada, would only cost \$200,000.

Hon. G. Foster moved a resolution favoring the lowest rate possible on newspapers and periodicals passing between Great Britain and the colonies. Mr. Foster contended that the advance of imperial sentiment was largely due to the dissemination of knowledge. He contended that as responsibilities had to be shouldered, Canada would have either to provide for national defense on her own account or in connection with the other colonies and the mother country. He believed this latter was the safer and better policy. The great security for peace was the conviction that in the chain of the British colonies throughout the world there was not one weak link.

Col. Denison, president, and the other officers of the league were elected to office and the names of Hon. James Sutherland, George T. Blackstock, Charles S. Hyman, M. P. of London, and Charles Cockshutt, of Toronto, were added to the executive committee of the council.

A SCENE OF SLAUGHTER

Barcelona's Streets Are Dyed With Her Citizens' Blood.

Artillery Brought to Bear Upon the Rioters and Hundreds Fell.

Large Numbers of Emigrants Destined for Canada—Strictures of Canadian Press on Chamberlain Justified.

Madrid, Feb. 21.—The papers this morning report many persons killed and wounded during yesterday's conflict at Barcelona.

The Herald says that the captain-general of Catalonia has asked for more troops as the rioters are getting out of hand. Troops are being sent to Barcelona from all other districts. A general panic prevails in the city.

A proclamation has been issued ordering all private individuals to surrender any weapons they may possess, under pain of severe penalties. The sale of arms has also been prohibited.

Forty workmen associations have been dissolved and the members of their committees arrested. The dwellings of the strike leaders and Anarchists are being registered and put under guard. The battleship Pelayo has been ordered to Barcelona.

London, Feb. 20.—A message from Barcelona via Perpignan, France, says a fierce battle has been fought between the troops and the rioters in the suburb of Barcelona, known as Sanao. Cavalry and infantry had been posted in the most dangerous points and a field battery had been located on the plaza from which advantage was being taken. The rioters could sweep the surrounding streets. When the final clash with the troops occurred, the artillery was brought into action and

Raked street after street. The rioters engaged the batteries at the entrance of the city, but were finally driven off. It is reported that 600 persons were killed and wounded on both sides. The entire neighborhood held for several days. The ruins caught fire and this completed the destruction.

Further fighting is reported at Martorell, fifteen miles from Barcelona. A large number of arms have been discovered. Fighting is also reported at Tortosa and Tarragona, respectively 100 and 50 miles southwest of Barcelona.

CHAMBERLAIN SCORED.

Strictures of the Canadian press on the reply of Colonial Secretary Joseph Chamberlain to the Welsh delegation of the National Agricultural League in London, Feb. 19, has been held for due to Mr. Chamberlain's energy and ability in fulfilling his duties that the Western Empire enjoyed such a long line of success. Three years ago, on the retirement of the late R. J. C. Dawson from the postmaster's office, Mr. Chamberlain was appointed to the position.

From his youth onward Mr. Chamberlain was an ardent devotee of many sports. He is remembered as pitcher of the famous Tecumseh Baseball Club and of the Forest City Club. Of late years he has devoted much time to curling, and he was one of the London City's most enthusiastic and expert players. He was a most active worker for the success of the London Old Boy movement, and his participation in the baseball matches at the reunions between the Old Boys and the Home Guard was always a feature of the game.

Mr. Chamberlain was a staunch Liberal, having held for years the secretary of the Reform Association. He was a member of the First Methodist Church. Mr. Chamberlain married Miss Emma Scandrett, daughter of the late John Scandrett. She survives him, with two sons—Edward and Thomas, aged 19 and 16 years respectively. Mr. Chamberlain is also survived by his mother, four sisters and one brother, they being: Mrs. Browne, 174 Hamilton road, London; Miss Belle W. Browne, operator for the N. W. Telegraph Company; Mrs. H. H. Nelles, San Diego, Cal.; Mrs. Brooks and Mrs. Tanton, London; and Mr. Fred G. Brow
