JO WAS A BAD INDIAN

Drank Firewater and Assaulted a Woman and Child.

Wore Handcuffs Ten Minutes After Matter Was Reported to Police.

Joseph Dostater, an Indian, employed at the car shops, got drunk and assaulted a woman and her child in West London, and ten minutes after the matter was reported to police headquarters the Indian was arrested by P. C. Harry Down.

The assault, which was minor in itself, but an assault, nevertheless, and something that will not be allowed in this city, took place between 6 and 7 o'clock on Mount Pleasant street. Mrs. Mary B. Palmer, who resides at No. 58, on that thoroughfare, was coming out of her gateway to the sidewalk, with her 7-year-old girl, Edith, when an Indian came along with a bicycle, which he was leading. Taking the child by the wrist, he told her to go with him. The mother, of course, interfered, and he then took hold of her by the arm, but she freed herself and ran across the street. The Indian then got away.

Mrs. Palmer had a good look at him, for they were near an electric light, and she was able to identify him. At 8:20 o'clock Mrs. Palmer reported the assault to the police, and P. C. Down, who happened to be in the station at the time, was ordered out on his wheel, and P. C. McDonald, coming on a few minutes later, was ordered out in another direction. Down wheeled past the house on Mount Pleasant street, and met the Indian apparently coming back from the cemetery, but without a wheel. He answered the description given by Mrs. Palmer, and what strengthened the officer's belief that it was the same man, was that he was wearing bicycle clips. When asked where his wheel was he said he had left it at the other side of the cemetery, and there it was found later. The Indian proved to be Dostater, and it was readily seen he had been drinking. At 8:45 o'clock he was landed at the Carling street station, being but 25 minutes after the assault was reported. At the police court he was fined \$15 and costs for assault, or one month in jail at hard labor, and \$2 for being drunk.

"OUR DAILY BREAD" DISCUSSED

BY REV. MARK GUY PEARSE

Lecture Given at the First Methodist Church Before a Very Large Audience.

THE new phases given to it when treated by Rev. Mark Guy Pearse. As a prophet of the future which this eminent English divine has found in this city, the attendance at the First

Methodist Church, on the occasion of his lecture last night, needs only to be mentioned. That life is a happier affair than people imagine is the burden of the speaker's argument. He talks of the little things as well as the big things in life, and with the former he is the more impressive. One of his sayings is that "the highest life a man can live has its roots in the soil of the little things."

"Our Daily Bread" was the subject upon which he was announced to speak, and the crowd that turned out to hear him packed the church long before the meeting began. At the outset he said it was a homely thing to talk about—a bit of bread—something that was in everybody's mouth. Yet he had decided that it would make a good subject when some time ago he was reading about Canadian wheat. Speaking of the Thanksgiving time that is approaching, Mr. Pearse said that it was the oldest thing in the world to have a Thanksgiving service without any thanksgiving.

From this the speaker turned to what he called a "standing miracle"—the bread. By corn he meant what was meant by the word in the Bible, and he said that it was the oldest thing in the world to have a Thanksgiving service without any thanksgiving.

Mr. Pearse traced the making of bread from the time it was a seed and planted, and his interesting talk was in the form of an autobiography of that seed of grain, whose life was known as it grew up. He applied the among other things he pointed out that the seed of grain is the people, and first of all there was the plowing and then the sowing and the steps of God in the world were traced. People, he said, too, had more for them than against them.

There was a limit to everything, said the speaker. The seed of grain was the beginning of civilization and the commerce of the world was built upon a slender ear of corn. Canada with its great west had a double blessing, having the land where the settler could come, and that which would supply the world with bread. As a matter of contrast he pointed out that might be given as a picture of a great famine in which the cry was ever "For God's sake, give us bread." That condition was a possibility, for the world was within six weeks of that condition, and he said that the seed that sowed was that which would give the world bread. It was because the crafty devil knew that man would keep it all, and the woman would go halves.

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
