THE GERMAN ARMY.

[From the Montreal Witness.]

So much has been written by foreign critics of the faults and short-comings of the British army that it is a relief to learn from similar sources that the armies of other nations are not any better. Recently a German military writer gave out the deliberate opinion that the army of the United States was "rotten throughout and lacking in the essentials of an effective fighting mechanic." fighting machine." Our neighbors were naturally indignant, and not only resented the charge, but turned their inkpot guns on the German army. While admitting its perfection of organization, they find its system of tactics, as shown in recent maneuvers, stupidly antiquated and utterly unfitted to meet the requirements of modern warfare. With gleeful satisfaction the United States press reproduces the comments on the German army. tion the United States press reproduces the comments on the German army of a correspondent of the London Spectator, who was present at the autumn maneuvers along the Rhine. This observed was amazed to see the oldfashioned plan of moving troops in masses of close formation within the firing zone carried out with spectacular precision. Infantry advancing eight deep, with support easily within effective artillery range, battalions chargwith bands playing and colors flying; cavalry in squadrons galloping about under close infantry fire; Itiliery retiring in a manner impossible in actual battle; generals, attended by numerous brilliant staffs, riding gently to and fro in the deadliest zones, presenting a martial picture indeed, but a hopelessly but intertain of the realities of the modern battlefield. From hopelessly bad imitation of the realities of the modern battlefield. From all this it would appear that the Germans have learned nothing from the wars in South Africa and Manchuria. If pitted against a nation which had learned the lessons of those wars, the German army would be badly worsted. But bad as this outward showing is, the internal condition is worse still. The Spectator correspondent found that the officers do not trust the men. They despair of turning them into soldiers, so they turn them into automatons instead. The object of their drill and iron discipline is to hammer into a man during peace-time, not intelligence or fighting instincts, but habits of unreasoning obedience, in the hope that these habits will become a second nature to him, and in battle prove stronger than fear. Under such a system close formation is a necessity. The automatons must be kept together, for they have no personal initiative and become bewildered when out of touch with their accustomed commander. It is furthermore charged by other critics that the German officers, as a class, have degenerated, have become self-indulgent, and are given to swaggering, drinking, gambling and lewdness. The picture is gloomy and may be overdrawn, but it is a question whether the erroneous discipline is not in a measure inseparable from an impressed army his career as clerk in a cigar store and whether the tendency of armies maintained in peace time is not necessarily towards demoralization.
