"It goes without saying that there must be hotel accommodation adequate to the needs of the traveling, boarding and lodging public; it does not follow that the bar must be part of the hotel equipment anywhere. One of the most urgently needed reforms is statutory provision for the licensing of hotels as such, and not for the purpose of selling liquor over a bar. A clear-cut and properly expressed distinction should be drawn between hotelkeeping and liquor selling, and if these two functions are authorized to be undertaken by one person, he should be licensed separately for each. The sooner the public are familiarized with this distinction the better. Travelers will then know that when they go to a hotel not licensed to sell liquors they are nevertheless in a genuine public house, managed with all the safeguards, and under all the responsibilities provided in the case of liquor-selling hostelries.
