AGAIN NO QUORUM

No. 1 Committee Has Another Minority Meeting.

No. 1 committee of the city council met yesterday afternoon and held a minority meeting. Ald. Cooper and Ald. Greenness being absent. Chairman Forristal, Ald. Gillen and Secretary Pope were present.

The application of the London Cement Brick Company, for a free site, etc., was referred to the manufacturers' committee.

A number of applications for remission of taxes were laid over.

The application of the Rambler Club for a room in the city hall was referred to the inspector to report.

The rental charged St. Andrew's Society for the use of the city hall for a banquet some time ago, was remitted.

THIS YEAR SURE

New License Act to Go Into Effect on May 1.

"I have it on the authority of a cabinet minister, who speaks on this matter with the same assurance as Premier Whitney, that the new license act will go into effect the 1st of May this year."

Ald. Forristal, chairman of No. 1 committee, made this statement at the meeting of the committee yesterday afternoon.

This means that the city's revenue from liquor licenses this year will be increased by about \$10,000, which is equal to one-half a mill on the tax rate.

As already announced, there is no reason to believe the people will be called upon to pay a higher tax rate this year than 20 mills.

AIDED SOME IMMIGRANTS

Charity Organization Gives Help to Number of New Arrivals.

The Charity Organization and Humane Society held its regular monthly meeting in the city hall yesterday afternoon.

The chief item of business was a discussion of the various cases dealt with during the past month. The society has assisted a number of new families several of whom were English immigrants. Most of the latter who came under the inspector's notice were of a class which will in all probability do well in this country, but just needed a little assistance and advice in order to give them a good start. Mr. Saunders told an interesting story of a family of six who arrived in this city a week or so ago with very little money in their pockets. The father is now working and receiving good wages, and the family are nicely settled, with bright prospects for the future. The children are bright and intelligent, and will make first-class citizens.

Other families were helped in various ways, the society always striving to give the assistance most suitable to the needs of each case. The report was adopted and other business of a routine nature transacted.

The fire last evening prevented many from attending the lecture at Bishop Cronyn Hall by Mr. Wm. Saunders. It was consequently postponed until next week.

An entertainment bearing a literary character, in the Pall Mall Church, last night, passed off very well, considering the absence of two or three gentlemen expected to be present. Mr. W. D. Buckle filled the chair creditably.
