SLAVERY RAMPANT

Turkey's Trade with Tripoli Confined to Young Girls and Boys.

Constantinople, Jan. 13.—Advices from Tripoli depict the horrors of the slave trade between Turkey and Tripoli in the darkest colors.

It is openly asserted that it is exclusively as a source of supply that the Porte cares to maintain the connection between Tripoli and the hinterland at all. In the regions of Nadali, Baghirmi, Gheera and the adjacent countries, slave raiding is marked with all the hideous butcheries with which Europe was familiarized twenty years ago and is openly carried on by Arabs and Turks solely for the supply of the Turkish market.

In these raids the adult population is mercilessly butchered, both men and women. Girls in particular and also boys are alone wanted. The miseries they endure in the long march to the Tripolitan coast are said to be indescribable.

Turkish ships make monthly trips and always sail by night with their human cargo. The price of a girl between eight and twenty is from \$20 upward.
