Could you tell me whether the manager of a company or corporation has to pay income tax on his salary (above the amount allowed by the act) received from such corporation or company as manager when the company has to pay a business tax? I understand a case of this kind was before the courts in London last year, but do not know the result. Ans.—Yes. The manager of a company or corporation if a householder, must pay income tax on his salary in excess of \$1,000. If not a householder, he must pay on all in excess of \$600. But if he is not paid a salary, and merely gets his share of the dividends of the company, then these dividends are not assessable.

THE SERGEANTS' BALL.

LIBERALS NAME

CHARLES S. HYMAN

Continued from Page Two.

For the benefit of those Liberals who were being asked to denounce their principles, to denounce their Hyman, the following was read: "The Hyman, McEvoy drew a parallel between this case and the Pacific scandal, in which it was shown that at one shot \$162,000 was spent to aid the Conservatives. He quoted from the official record of the House of Commons, stating that friends of the Sir John A. Macdonald Government expected to be assisted with funds in the pending election, and that any sum which his (Sir Hugh Allan) company might expend for that purpose would be repaid to him. The sum expended was: Sir John A., \$25,000; Sir Hector Langevin, \$15,000; Sir George Cartier, \$20,000; Sir John A., \$20,000 (additional); Sir Hector Langevin, \$10,000 (additional); Sir George Cartier, \$30,000 (additional); central committee, \$39,000.

Should Not Be Tolerated.

"When you see Conservatives going about the city, it is a great shame that so much money should have been spent in the London election, just ask them if they remember the expenditure of \$162,000 in behalf of Sir John A.," said Mr. McEvoy, amid applause. He further quoted a telegram from Sir John A. saying that he must have another \$10,000, and that no more calls would be made, to which the reply came, "Draw on me for \$10,000."

"I say to you, gentlemen of this city," added Mr. McEvoy, "that if you do not tolerate the kind of performance by which this election was thrust upon the people of London, you or your children will answer for it in the next half century with their blood."

"Has a man a right to be hauled to Toronto and sweat-boxed, as was done in the London election case?"

"No," came the chorus from the hall.

"You should not sanction such a precedent. I hope there is not one who calls himself a Liberal who will countenance that sort of thing. I think you will find in your canvass of the city that that kind of practice is not to be tolerated by any person. I think the whole proceeding that has brought on this election is a most dangerous character. Show that you do not countenance it by returning Hon. C. S. Hyman." (Cheers.)

Senator Coffey.

Senator Coffey was given a hearty reception. He said the Liberals of London are to be congratulated upon the splendid home they have in Hyman Hall. He also congratulated all present upon the splendid spirit being manifested by the rank and file of the Liberals in London. It was easy to see by the faces of those present, and by the spirit of the meeting that Hon. C. S. Hyman will again be London's representative in the Ottawa parliament.

"I have had the opportunity of seeing Mr. Hyman very frequently in Ottawa," the senator continued, "and I can say this much in speaking of his health, that nearly a year ago I noticed

often lament the lack of interest shown by hundreds of those who pass through them every day. They seem to observe nothing and see only the walk at their feet. This lack of observation often reminds me of the anecdote of the professor and his class of students. He told them they saw and did not observe. There is a great difference between seeing an object and observing the same closely.

Cost and value of parks from a business point of view do not mean any wild expenditure of money. But money wisely and well expended will invariably prove a good and profitable investment. Boards of assessors prove that their inexperience is money well invested. The taxable value of lands in the neighborhood of parks increases immensely thereby, adding to the municipality's income. W. E. Edger-ton, superintendent of parks of Albany, New York, says of the Albany park: "The history of Albany is that the ground contiguous to the parks has not only doubled, but quadrupled and septupled. One piece of property was worth \$5,500, and by the simple expenditure of \$1,800 on it the value of that property was raised more than 20 times in eight years."

In 1856 the assessed value of the three wards adjoining Central Park, New York, was \$20,423,000. In 1873, seventeen years later, it had increased to \$28,681,000, a gain of \$8,258,000. In the United States and Canada, New York spends 60 cents per head of population on her parks per annum. Albany spends 40 cents, Buffalo about 45 cents, Detroit 50, Chicago 45, Toronto 30, and this year Toronto estimates are for 45 cents. Appropriations for maintenance should be liberal. The playgrounds of the people should be kept at a high standard of maintenance at all times.

Parks have a healthy and wonderfully uplifting influence, and go a long way towards raising the standing of the city in the eyes of not only the citizens themselves, but to the observing and progressive stranger. Well-kept parks, streets and boulevards give a city an air of respectability and have the same general effect that a clean, respectable dress on a lady or gentleman has upon her or himself and on the whole community.

Parks cannot be well kept and improved without money. It may surprise many to know what is spent per annum by some of the larger cities, both in the United States and Canada. New York spends 60 cents per head of population on her parks per annum. Albany spends 40 cents, Buffalo about 45 cents, Detroit 50, Chicago 45, Toronto 30, and this year Toronto estimates are for 45 cents. Appropriations for maintenance should be liberal. The playgrounds of the people should be kept at a high standard of maintenance at all times.

The parks and boulevards belong to all of the people, and are always open to all citizens on equal terms. Special privileges to none, nor the use of them are given to any one for any purpose not practically common to all and consistent with the proper use of public parks. J. S. quite a change in his appearance. If those who now wonder at his illness could see him at work every day as I have seen him; if they could see the amount of work he transacted daily, and the amount of work he had in contemplation, they would wonder no longer.

"Not only did he have his own work of the department of public works, but he had arrears of work from the time of Mr. Tarte's administration, and arrears of work from Mr. Sutherland's time. But the latter was through no fault of Jim Sutherland, who has passed away. He was ill and could not attend to it. All this work Mr. Hyman had, but he never complained.

Mr. Hyman's Generosity.

"Something has been said by Mr. Purdom as to Mr. Hyman's qualifications. We know them well, indeed. But there is one little story I would like to tell those who may not know it. In the House of Commons the question of pensions for the aged and penniless has been brought up. I think the scheme will yet be adopted. I know that C. S. Hyman is a man who dislikes having the good things he does made public. But I want to tell you that this same system of old-age pensions I referred to was first put into operation in London by Mr. Ellis W. Hyman, Charlie Hyman's father—a man who was revered by all classes of men in London, and who was undoubtedly one of the fairest employers of labor in the whole Dominion of Canada. (Cheers.) C. S. Hyman has followed in his father's footsteps, and it is known to you all that he is one of the fairest employers of labor in London. But it may not be known to you that every week there are aged ex-employees of Mr. Hyman's who go to the office and draw their old-age pensions, out of the profits of the company. This is the class of man C. S. Hyman is. (Cheers.)

"But there are very many reasons beside this why you should continue to have Mr. Hyman as your member. I ask you, one and all, to take off your coats and work so to show this good friend of ours, who is far away, that his friends in London are still loyal, and that they have determined to elect him by a larger majority than ever before." (Cheers.)

Ex-Mayor F. G. Rumball also addressed the meeting briefly. He predicted a splendid victory for the Liberals, and for the ever-popular C. S. Hyman.

Nomination Unanimous.

At the conclusion of ex-Mayor Rumball's remarks, Mr. Gibbons stated that he had never had any doubt as to the result of the by-election. The Liberal Government is in power, and London has the opportunity to continue to have a representative who will also hold the portfolio of public works, second only in importance to that of minister of finance. That is an honor to any city. It is in the material interests of the city to have Mr. Hyman there. He has already done much for the city. (Applause.) He will do still more. The feeling will prevail that it will be better for London to be represented by Mr. Hyman. Mr. Gibbons assured the Liberals that it must be an earnest fight on their part—doubtly earnest because their candidature will not be able to participate in the campaign.

"How can they beat us?" asked Mr. Gibbons.

"They can't."

"Who will change his vote because of the so-called expose at Toronto?" continued Mr. Gibbons.

To which came the ready reply that the Liberals will stand firm.
