LONDON FANS AND PLAYERS JUBILANT OVER BIG VICTORY

Good Pitching and Timely Hitting Responsible for Winning Wheat Area Is Nearly 60,000 Last Eight Games-Every Man on Team Is Playing a Great Game.

[BY JINX.] There was gloom in St. Thomas last evening, while this city seemed to e in the throes of intense delight, or something to that effect. Yesterday afternoon the large crowd in front of The Advertiser watching the results of the Canadian Leagues games nearly blocked traffic on Dundas street, and when the final innings came in, and it was seen that London had jumped to the top of the league the crowd cheered enthusiastically.

PLAYERS JUBILANT. The London team arrived back home early last evening, and every one of the players was jubilant over the fact that the club had arrived on top of the heap at last. BROKE WINNING RECORD.

Linneborn was the star of the series if any one man can be picked out as a star, and there is little doubt that he is the most valuable man in the league as a run-getter, a hitter, and prominently in the series. Myers and "Dad" Stewart have recovered from their temporary batting slumps, and they are clouting the ball at a merry clip at present, while the rest of the team is also hitting.

CHAPUT RECOVERS OLDTIME FORM.

FINE HARVEST IS LOOKED FOR ALL OVER CANADA

Acres Greater Than Last Year.

The Outlook Is for a Record Harvest All Through the West.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Ottawa, July 17.-Reports received from correspondents enable the cenrevised estimates of the areas sown o spring crops this year and also estimates of the areas devoted to the latter sown cereals and hoed crops. With regard to wheat the reports are entirely confirmatory of those issued a month ago, and the area under wheat in Canada is therefore finally placed at 9,816,300 acres, or 57,900 acres more han in 1912.

The area in spring wheat is 8,990,500 cres, or 13,100 acres more than 1912, and the area to be harvested of fall wheat remains at 825,800 acres. Oats are estimated to occupy 9,646,-400 acres, an increase of \$429,500 acres, barley, 1,430,800 acres, an increase of
