

ALD. J. C. WILSON FAVORS PURCHASING STREET RAILWAY

Gives Notice He Will Move To
Negotiate With Company.

GARBAGE QUESTION UP

Ald. Watkinson Contends Cost
of Department Increasing
Too Rapidly.

Ald. Cameron Wilson gave notice to the city council last night that he will move at the next meeting to empower the Hydro-Electric Power Commission to open negotiations with the Street Railway Company for the purchase of the road. As usual with notices of this kind there was no discussion.

Ald. F. R. Watkinson's motion to have the cost of garbage collection limited by contract was referred to No. 2 committee. The committee is to report on the whole question of collection by contract and under the present city system.

Annual Maintenance \$70,000. Ald. Watkinson said he was not criticizing the garbage department, as he believed it was doing the best it could. He claimed, however, that the annual cost of maintaining the department is now \$70,000, in comparison with \$48,000 when it was started, while the area from which collections were made was not appreciably increased. If this continued, he contended, the city would not be able to pay for it. He was not in favor of contract systems as a rule, but he did not believe the present system of collection was a success of the present system of collection. The homes of the workers should not be taxed two dollars for the collection of garbage when they could get the same results for one dollar under a different system. He thought the department should be entirely separate from the city engineers. Replacing horses and wagons with motor equipment and the sale of by-products were other reforms which he urged.

Indorsed Harbor Project. The motion passed Saturday by representatives of various bodies urging the Dominion government to improve the Port Stanley harbor was indorsed. Ald. P. J. Watt and Cameron Wilson were appointed as representatives of the council on a deputation which is to lay the matter before Parliament.

Efforts will be made to make a special check of the figures for London in the next census. The chamber of commerce pointed out that the census is being taken by electoral districts. This means that the annexed districts will be recorded as part of East Middlesex. Unless care is exercised London will not get credit for as large a population as it should.

No Official Information. Ald. Cameron Wilson asked when the McTear bill giving the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board power to fix street railway rates, would come before the Legislature. There was no official information available. Ald. Wilson was appointed to take Ald. Bridge's position with Ald. W. A. Wilson and P. J. Watt on the deputation which will protest against the bill in the Ontario Legislature.

GENERAL SESSION OF W. O. ACADEMY OF MEDICINE WEDNESDAY

Will Be First Public Function
At New Western University
Medical School.

The first public function to be held in the new Western University Medical School on Ottawa avenue will be a general session of the Western Ontario Academy of Medicine to be held in the auditorium of the above institution on Wednesday at 2 p.m. Dr. James T. Case, Battle Creek, Mich., president of the American Roentgen Rays Society, editor of the American Roentgen Ray Journal, and also a writer in surgery, will give a lantern slide X-ray demonstration on "Diagnosis of the Upper Right Quadrant of the Abdomen," and Dr. W. T. Connell, professor of medicine, Queen's University, Kingston, will read a paper on "Sub-Acute Bacterial Endocarditis." Dr. Connell served as a medical officer overseas with No. 2 General Hospital, which was a Queen's University unit.

In addition to local physicians, nurses and medical students, many Western Ontario doctors will be in attendance at this session.

London Votes Dry By Large Majority Wets Disappointed

The referendum vote in the city of London shows a majority of nearly 3,000 for the "drys." This result has afforded great satisfaction to the members of the Referendum Association, who worked so hard to win. The total number of votes polled is not quite so large as in the referendum of 1919, but there is no doubt that it would have been much larger had the people been properly acquainted with the polling subdivisions in the various wards. The great number of inquiries that came over the telephone indicated in no uncertain manner that there was much confusion regarding this matter.

It is therefore quite evident that public interest in yesterday's voting far surpassed that of the last occasion, and that the citizens fully recognized the importance of the question at issue.

Much Gratification. Rev. T. D. McCullough, secretary of the Referendum Committee, and his staff, had a busy evening receiving the returns from the various subdivisions, and according to them in their due order. A considerable number of the supporters of the prohibition movement thronged the police headquarters the evening, and much gratification was expressed when the figures indicated that the poll was in favor of the "drys."

Mr. McCullough said that he had felt the utmost confidence that prohibition would be well supported in London on this occasion, owing to the city's previous record, and spoke in laudatory terms of the strenuous work that had been performed by the women who acted as scrutineers and others who had done their utmost to win a victory for prohibition.

Toronto "Wets" Hope. There were also scenes of considerable animation at the offices of the Citizens' Liberty League, but as it became evident that in the great majority of the polling subdivisions the city was going dry, doubts were expressed as to the ultimate result. The news that Toronto had gone "wet" made up to some extent, however, for the attitude of London, and the hope was expressed that when the total returns for the province were made known the "wets" would find still further consolation.

Locked Up Three Days in Brantford Refrigerator.

That milk and butter can be locked up together with onions, fish and limburger cheese for 72 hours or more and still remain fresh and free from taint, is possible, was demonstrated in a practical manner, when the "Brantford" Refrigerator that was locked up and chained last Friday by two of London's newspapermen, was reopened by a prominent medico yesterday, who pronounced the contents in a perfect state of preservation.

The refrigerator used in this test was one chosen at random from the stock of the Thomas Furniture Company, it having been on view in one of their windows since the sealing three days before.

Not only were the contents in good condition, but the interior walls were so dry that a match was easily lighted when struck on the walls of the ice chamber, close to the ice. Another remarkable feature was the low ice consumption, only 35 pounds of ice being consumed during the period of test.

Notwithstanding the stormy weather on Saturday the Myrtle Warbler reported on the 9th was again found in the same vicinity. Cold does not seem to affect this hardy member of the Warbler family, it being largely a matter of food supply whether they remain north or not during the winter months. In the New England states where the Bay Berry is common, the Myrtle Warbler is found every winter. It is from this bush, the Bay Berry or Myrtle, that the bird receives its name.
