Toronto, Dec. 2.—"I have been told the story circulated by a German spy that Richthofen, the German ace, landed safely behind the Canadian lines and was afterwards shot by two men of the 149th battalion," said Capt. A. Roy Brown, the Canadian airman who was officially credited with destroying the German, in an interview with The Advertiser. "The story," he continued, "is absolute nonsense. Richthofen was shot in the air, his plane crashed behind the Australian lines and he was dead when taken from his machine."

In refutation of the story Capt Brown gave the bare official details of his exploit. "Richthofen," he said, "was following one of our planes. I came up behind him and opened fire. I could see that he was hit, for he collapsed and his plane crashed to the ground.
