MISS CONSTANCE BOULTON RAISES SILVER-BLACK FOXES

London Visitor Runs Successful Little Farm in North Toronto.

Miss Constance Boulton of Toronto who came to London yesterday to address a Conservative campaign meeting last night, is a breeder of silver foxes and pedigree chickens when she is not a politician.

On an attractive little acre of ground in North Toronto, she and her sister, Miss Elizabeth Boulton, run a most successful little poultry farm and raises silver black foxes for their beautiful pelts.

Miss Constance Boulton has a special interest in the foxes. She believes the business of fox-breeding can be a much more profitable one than chicken-raising and sees in it a new industry for women. Two years ago she purchased a magnificent pair of silver foxes, who have equaled the best of Gypsy and Rover. Today she has twelve fine silver foxes, having sold three.

To the question: "Are they hard to raise? Have you any?" she answers: "Not a one." Some people say that they are quite difficult to raise. But I have had no trouble. Of course they are like everything else, they want care and must be studied closely. I really find it easier to take care of foxes than of chickens. Chickens to me are far more trouble and less profitable.

Miss Boulton is very fond of her old pair of foxes, Gypsy and Rover, and has become quite attached to the younger foxes as well. Sometimes it is difficult to part with them, but that is "business," she says. And when she is breeding them for sale she must not let sentiment come into any of her bargains.

Although the foxes are quite tame at Miss Boulton's farm, they still keep some of their wild instincts. "And it's not unusual to get a good hip," she says. "However, when you're breeding silver foxes you expect something of the sort. It is all part of the game."

With the help of her sister, Miss Boulton incubated between 30 and 40 chickens last year. All were sold with the exception of some 70 or 80, which are being kept over the winter. The chickens, too, bring in an excellent income.

Miss Boulton delights in her work, and is never happier than when watching over her chickens and beautiful silver black foxes in North Toronto. She believes she has proved the worthwhileness of fox-raising on a small scale and urges more women to go into the industry.

HOME NURSING CLASSES ARE BEING ARRANGED

Dr. Le Touzel Will Be Lecturer—Lord Kitchener Certificates To Be Presented.

Exceptionally interesting and instructive classes in home nursing are being arranged by the Lord Kitchener nursing division of the St. John Ambulance corps, of which, in this city, Miss Ella Davis is in charge. The classes, though they do not start until the new year, have been thoroughly planned and arrangements for them are complete. Dr. R. Le Touzel has been secured as the lecturer.

Members of the division who enjoyed the classes in other years are also anticipating the coming lesson. The certificate given at the conclusion of the course is recognized wherever St. John Ambulance work is taken up.

Arrangements are also being made for the annual inspection and presentation of certificates, which takes place on November 18 in the Central collegiate auditorium. It is expected that some 75 candidates will be present to receive their certificates for first examination and that about 15 will receive certificates for re-examination in home nursing and first aid.

The men's first aid class has been postponed until after the Christmas season. It will be resumed in the new year.
