Little Lessons In Golf

In hitting at the ball without looking at it, as described in yesterday's lesson, you will, with practice, begin to feel the sense of rhythm in the down stroke of the club, and even if you miss the ball the own stroke will "feel" better and thus enable you to make progress.

If you miss the ball while swinging the club from the top of the stroke, after looking at the position of your left arm and the wrist, it will be because you try to change the path of your clubhead through the coming conscious of some detail and, trying to change it, you of course miss the ball. In that case, go back to the beginning, note your club regularly, raise it with the straight left arm, look at the position of arm, and left wrist, then swing the club down without looking at the ball. Your result should be a perfect hit, whether you see the ball or not.
