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ENTRY LIST FOR BIG RACE

Never before in the whole 20 years of the Dunlop Trophy race has such an entry list greeted the handicappers as the one for Waterloo, July 1st. The total number of riders entered is 110. The nearest to this record was 97, which 1903 boasted.

Not only does 1913 surpass all records for entries, but in the number of districts represented by the riders it also sets a record. Charlottetown, P. E. I., has a representative in Geo. L. Prowse, son of Senator Prowse. Winnipeg has her representative in G. H. Beemer, who rode to Toronto in 11 days. St. Thomas has one, Brantford has six, Stratford four, Hamilton two, Ottawa 2, Galt 2, the balance being made up of Toronto riders.

No less a champion than W. H. Hinchings of 135 lbs. boxes, is to be seen on the 94-minute mark.

MONTREAL, June 30.—Jack Johnson, the negro pugilist, accompanied by his wife, Lucille Cameron Johnson, sailed for Havre on the Alcan line steamer Corinthian at three o'clock yesterday morning. Johnson boarded the steamer Saturday night in the presence of the Canadian immigration officials who will watch his progress Europeanward until he is beyond their jurisdiction.

Just before going aboard the Corinthian, Johnson reiterated the declaration that he had no intention of jumping his bail bond in Chicago, and was merely going to Europe to retrench the losses he has sustained in his trials. He declared he would be in hand when his appeal is argued in November. Johnson took with him two automobiles—a limousine and a high-power touring car.

WANT CHURCH PARTY.

Roman Catholic Convention Favors Political Activity.

THREE RIVERS, Que., June 30.—The supremacy of the church in matters moral and religious, its right to be sole director of the education of its youth and the necessity of a united Roman Catholic party in Canada, instead of the old division of Liberals and Conservatives. These were among the doctrines reaffirmed at the opening of the congress of the Association Catholique de la Jeunesse Canadienne, which took place in the City Hall Saturday evening, some two hundred delegates being present from various parts of the province. The hall was filled with citizens of the town, who are showing great interest in the congress and have decorated their houses for the occasion.

The meeting was opened by Maurice Gelin, who welcomed the delegates on the part of the members from Three Rivers. Dr. Geo. H. Baril of Laval University, Montreal, outlined the object of the congress and the subject of discussion in its meetings. The association numbers 4,000 members, and has for its object the preparation of a generation of militant defenders of the Roman Catholic religion and the Canadian nation. It chose to discuss the vexed subject of primary education in the Province of Quebec because of the prominence of the question in recent discussion and because it is firmly convinced that the criticism adverse to the Roman Catholic system is without any foundation in actual fact. Dr. Baril spoke of the public as the battleground on which were arrayed the contending forces of the church and the state.
