PERSIAN PARTIES RESORT TO ARMS

Parliament Members Fire on Troops and Buildings Are Stormed

CASUALTY LIST IS LONG

Halls of Parliament Are Finally Cleared—The Soldiers and Populace Pillage

Teheran, June 23.—After a bloody fight which was waged around the parliament buildings today, the city was comparatively quiet, although Cosacks were seen in the streets and squares.

Cosacks and soldiers early in the morning surrounded the parliament buildings and demanded that a number of persons who arrest the Shah had ordered be forthwith handed over to them.

Orders were at once issued from military headquarters that the parliament buildings be bombarded and the bombardment commenced soon after 10 o'clock.

Berlin, June 25.—News has just been received here that the troops of the Shah of Persia have stormed and captured the parliament buildings in Teheran.
