


very brevalent in an just of the management of the bronchist is an inflammation of the mucous membrane of the bronchial tubes, and is one of the most common of the pulmonary affections. Chronic bronchists more often occurs later in life. When a cold settles on the lungs, the discase either ends in bronchists or graemonia. If it ends in bronchists, it usually passes off as a cold in the chest, and still the patient does not feel entirely weil. He feels tired and languid, and is incapable of taking his usual amount of exercise, and experience a shortness of breath, with more or less warm in the palms of his hands. Soon after this a cough appears accompanied by an expectoration of thick mucous, followed by a heetic flush, loss of flesh and strength, and night sweats continue, when the patient assumes all the appearance of having a genuine case of consumption. But this is simply catarrh of the lungs or chronic bronchitis.

In the latter stages of the disease the mucous membrane of the larger bronchial tube softens while in the smaller tubes and air cells of the lungs the nucous membrane becomes congested and inflamed. There are no cavities or tubercles in the lungs, but merely a wasting away of the larger bronchial tubes, and death takes place from obstruction of the bronchial tubes and air cells of the lungs.
