The Probability Is He Will Allow It to The Probability is He Will Allow it to Become Law Without His Signature.

Now that the Tariff bill has been passed by the House the next subject of speculation is as to the President's position regarding it. Will he sign it or permit it to become a law without his signature, or will his disapproval of the measure lead him to veto it? There are few who believe that he will take so extreme a course as vetoing the bill. There are not many who believe the President will sign the bill. It is thought his opposition to the measure is so strong that he cannot consistently affix his signature to it, but rather than have no tariff legislation by this Congress he will permit it to become a law without signing it.
