letter arrived in Watford on Monday and  
is now installed as a bugler of C. Com-  
pany.

Toronto, Ont. Wednesday, Feb. 23,  
1916. Dear Sir:—I see in the Evening  
Telegram your ad for Bandmen in the  
149th Battalion for Overseas and would  
be pleased to know if you take boys as  
Buglers, if so I would be very glad to  
join. I am sixteen years of age and my  
father will let me go as he was over with  
the 3rd Battalion but when in England  
was sent back unfit for service. I also  
have a brother in the same Battalion  
now in France in the trenches, and an-  
other brother in England wounded, and  
still another one in Toronto with the  
127th Battalion training for overseas, and  
a brother making munitions in Toronto.  
This makes them all doing their bit but  
me. Kindly write and let me know  
soon, if I can join your Battalion.

### Mr. Bramhill Named for Import- ant Position

SARNIA, March 7.—Mr. G. G. Bram-  
hill, district representative of the Onta-  
rio department of agriculture, has been  
appointed by the Dominion Government  
as flax expert for the whole of the Dom-  
inion.

He will have full charge of the flax op-  
erations from coast to coast, carrying on  
experiments in different centers for the  
purpose of finding out what localities are  
best suited for flax growing and in the  
different qualities that are produced. He  
will also inspect the various kinds of  
machinery used throughout the coun-  
try.

His appointment to this position  
speaks highly of his abilities and also  
brings to the attention of the people at  
large that Lambton county is one of the  
leading counties for flax industries.  
Some of the best flax in the Dominion is  
grown here.

Mr. Bramhill comes from Petrolia, and  
although he is a comparatively young  
man, his knowledge of agricultural work  
is without limit. He will also work in  
conjunction with the Soldiers' Aid Com-  
mission to get work for returned soldiers.  
His ground will be unlimited and he ex-  
pects to furnish some excellent results  
while looking after the flax industries of  
the country.

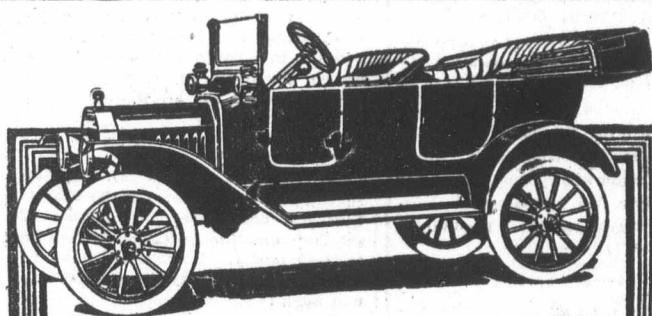
Mr. Peter McPhedran, of the 2nd line

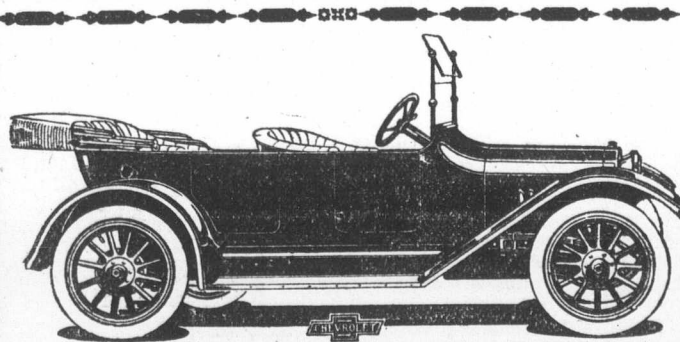
