BOARD OF EDUCATION

Minutes of a regular meeting of the Watford Board of Education held in the Library Board Room on Monday, August 26th, at 7.30 p.m. Present—Dr. Howden, chairman; J. W. McLaren, Dr. Siddall, J. D. Brown, E. D. Swift, John McKercher, C. W. Vail and Dr. Newell.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

An account of \$4.00 from The Guide-Advocate for printing was read.

McKercher—Swift, and carried, that the Guide-Advocate account be paid.

McLaren—Siddall, and carried, that we ask our Municipal Council for \$160.00 for public school requirements.

Communication was read from Principal Steer with regard to the salaries of the High School staff.

McLaren—Brown, and carried, that the communication from Mr. Steer be accepted and acted upon.

Vail—McLaren, and carried, that we grant the High School principal and staff increase in salaries as follows:—

Principal Steer \$150, Mr. McKenzie \$150, Miss McCaw \$100 and Miss Mitchell \$100.

Dr. Siddall gave the following verbal report of his medical inspection as Health Officer of the pupils of the Public School: Enlargement of Adenoids and Tonsils—25 cases. Some of these did not require operation as they were not diseased but open to infection, and should be attended to as soon as becoming diseased; others should have been operated on this summer.

Eyes—12 cases of defective eyesight. Ears—1 case of middle ear trouble, complicating adenoids.

Otherwise, on the whole, the health of the school was considered fair.

McKercher—Swift, and carried, that the doctor's report be received and inserted in the minutes.

Newell—Swift, and carried, that we adjourn.

London, Sept. 6th to 14th

The Buildings at London's Exhibition this year will be exceptionally good. Several new firms are placing exhibits. The Government are placing exhibits of Wool and Eggs, also general exhibit in the Agricultural Building and a special exhibit pertaining to Domestic Science work and Conservation of Food, which will also be in the Agricultural Building. A loan of fine pictures from the National Art Gallery, Ottawa, which will add very

materially to the Art Exhibit. For the Dairy Department there will be a fine exhibit of Cheese and Butter as usual. For the Machinery Department everything new will be exhibited, from the large tractor and threshing outfit to the smallest bit of machinery in use. The Process Building will be filled with a Pure Food Show. There will be a large entry of Live Stock as the management have added \$1500.00 to what was already a very liberal prize list. A large addition has been built to the sheep pens and a suitable place for judging the sheep has been provided.

Everything considered, this should be the best Exhibition ever held in London.

Deeds of Seaman's Daring Pass Unnoticed.

The fame of the Mercantile Marine will never be written as it deserves to be written, and the recompense due will never be paid to its courageous and devoted members.

The ships of the Merchant Service are solitary wayfarers, scattered units on a waste waters, fighting a lone fight with the perils of the deep, far from the appreciative eyes of those who see and have the genius to portray heroic deeds in vivid spirit.

The deeds of our seafarers are too multitudinous to be enclosed between the covers of a handbook. There is a monotonous sameness about many of these tragedies of the sea, epic though they are, and worthy of reproduction on canvas and on paper. Reinforcement For Tank Battalion

Headquarters, Military District No. 1, London, Ontario, August 29th, 1918.

Men are required for reinforcement draft for 1st. Canadian Tank Battalion; qualifications as follows:— 1. Category "A", 2. Age, 19 to 35 inclusive.

They should have Educational qualifications similar to the University Canadian Officer's Training Corps; that is the Matriculation examination to Universities or its equivalent.

Class 1. Men under Military Service Act, not yet called for duty, may volunteer for this Unit. This includes the 19 year old Class.

Men under Military Service Act enlisting before expiration of Exemption granted, may enlist in this Unit.

Applicants may apply to any authorized Medical examiner in the District for medical examination or direct to Mobilization Centre, Carling Block, London, Ontario.
