FINANCES .-- The receipts for the month amounted to \$9,982.62; the disbursements to \$6,225.22. The receipts are unusually large owing to the March Offerings.

NOTES FROM THE FIREDS -W. P. Bentley writes: "The work in Shanghai is exceedingly important. This is really the most important commercial city in China. There is more missionary influence here than in any other city in the Empire, even than in Pekip. If we have any work here, we ought to have a strong work. I am not asking for anything for Shanghai just now, but will put in our claim as soon as the hospital, the girls' school and the residences are provided. I am now able to conduct a short service in the Shanghai dialect, to preside at the Lord's Supper, and teach my class in Sunday school with some satisfaction. This is a good deal of consolation to mr, as I have had to learn two dialects in my first year."-Dr. Macklin writes that it is thought by all that one large building will cost less and be more serviceable than a number of cottages. The names that were to be put on the cottages can be inscribed on the different wards. Miss E. Inco and Miss A. I. White reached China January 9. They had a pleasant voyage, and begin their work in good spirits and with high hopes .- C. E.
