

1978 and receipts were actually transferred at a closing meeting held on June 7. (b) These measures were taken in compliance with the terms of the original program approval at which time it was stated that efforts should be made to replace the Government guarantee with alternative commercial financing. The measure also has the effect of both reducing and fixing the cost to Canadair of borrowed funds. (c) The issue incorporates an 8½ per cent coupon, the yield of which, including a 1 per cent discount, is 8.76 per cent. (d) Canadair has hitherto been paying prime banking rates, currently 9¼ per cent, plus a fee to the government for the loan guarantee of 1 per cent.

2. The funding arrangements now in place respond directly to the current program and schedule and financing is therefore expected to be adequate. The timing of the first flight has not given rise to the need for additional financing.

3. The original target date for first flight, March 1978, assumed that selected airframe components would be designed and built in specialized prototyping facilities in the U.S. It was later decided largely from economic reasons to build the first flight test aircraft, entirely in Canada, and as a pre-production prototype rather than an engineering test vehicle. This means that the present configuration more closely resembles the eventual first production aircraft in that it has been built on production tooling. The current program schedule has been in existence for some time now and is universally accepted as being extremely ambitious. Performance to date against these severe targets has been most encouraging and should be construed as an achievement rather than otherwise.
