PROPOSED POLICY CHANGE

ANATOLY SHCHARANSKY—FORTHCOMING VISIT TO UNITED

We hope and pray that Anatoly and Avital will visit Canada and meet our Prime Minister (Mr. Mulroney) and their thousands of friends across this land. Anatoly's victorious battle for the cause of Soviet Jewry, both refusniks and prisoners of conscience, helps to sustain all of us as we march toward greater victories in the war against the Soviets' violations of human rights.

GASOLINE EXPORTS TO UNITED STATES

Mr. Ian Waddell (Vancouver—Kingsway): Mr. Speaker, I found out that we refine 550,000 barrels a day of gasoline in Canada. In February 50,000 barrels of refined gasoline was exported to the United States. In other words, we are exporting refined Canadian gasoline to the United States which is then sold cheaper in the U.S. than it is in Canada.

I found out as well that the Canadian independent retailers cannot buy this cheap gasoline in Canada so they go to the United States. In February they imported 10,000 barrels of refined gasoline a day. The independent retailers did a loop, if you like. What kind of energy policy is that, Mr. Speaker, when independents have to go to the United States to buy the cheap gasoline they cannot buy in Canada? That is a crazy energy policy.

What we are seeing is a failure. We have the worst of all possible worlds. Canadian motorists are paying more than Americans for gasoline, and Canadian producers, especially in the Province of Alberta, are getting killed by the Western Accord.
