NUCLEAR ARMAMENTS

INDIAN SUBCONTINENT—ARMS RACE DEPLORED

Mr. John Oostrom (Willowdale): Mr. Speaker, the Indian subcontinent threatens to become a flash point for a major confrontation. India is pursuing a massive armament program which has included the successful testing of a nuclear device, and a delivery system. It soon will receive a used Soviet nuclear powered submarine.

Pakistan, reacting to its neighbour's build-up, has embarked on its own armament program which has included the testing of a missile capable of carrying a nuclear device.

Canada is a major contributor of aid to these countries. I am concerned that Canadian tax dollars which are earmarked to aid the people will help indirectly to subsidize this arms race. Canadian aid will allow these two nations to be able to divert more of their own resources to either produce or acquire arms.

In light of these developments the Government must examine our aid to these two nations and all other nations which put armaments above the well-being of their people.
