that they accepted the position that the Chairman and Dr. Putman had informed themselves fully on all parts of this section of the work.

MOF. HUHES: I think me got that partly from the Me-

THE FRINCIPAL: What evidence did the Committee have before it indicating that the memorizing of the contents of a book was deemed to be important in the School for Teachers. At the bottom of Page 199: "It had not been expected that the reading of books and the memorizing

of their contents would have been deemed important, except inso far as books ministered to the needs and desires of youth".

PROF. HUGHES: Mr. Chairman, again, for the same reason, I have no information to offer on that point. Chapter 15 is something I have not seen, and the same applies to my colleagues.

THE PRINCIPAL: The Committee, in reviewing the body of the Report in celley proof, did not really undertake to question statements made?

PROF. HUGHES: I think, sir, by the circumstances under which we were working, we had to some extent to rely on special know ledge of certain members, and special contributions of certain Chairmen of sub-committees. There was no other way feasible.

DEAN IEMESSURIER: May I ask about page 141 - there is
