EXPORT DEMAND RALLIES WHEAT

Rain in Kansas Somewhat Relieves Apprehension as to Crop Outlook.

CHICAGO, June 5 .- Large sales of cash wheat today for prompt shipment out of Chicago had a railying effect on deferred deliveries. Altho the market closed weak, latest prices ranged from %c off to %c net advance. Corn finished 1/2 to 1/2 up, oats, down a shade to 1/2 and provisions

reased in cost 21/2c to 5c. Sales of cash wheat here amounted to 550,000 bushels, the most generous total in a long time. The greater part was

in a long time. The greater part was hard winter to go to a Baltimore exporter, who deals chiefly with rortugal. Dulith also disposed of 150,000 busnels for export. Bullish sentiment was further aided by grain dealers estimating the Kansas harvest as low as 70,00,000 busnels.

Timely Rains in Kansas.

The stock weakness had a depressing effect at the outset and was again influential near the close. At both times rains in Kansas were also reported just when opportune for the bears. Taking the day as a whole, however, the bulls had the advantage, and however, the bulls had adverse crop dylces from Missouri and Russia.
