AUSTRIA has 300,000 Men Ready To Advance Into Italy ITALY Rushes Best Troops to the Border To Prevent an Invasion by Austria.

RUSSIANS TAKE CRACOW: Copenhagen, Dec. 7.—The northern section of the outer forts of Cracow have been destroyed by the Russian artillery, which has also begun the bombardment of the eastern and northeastern sections. The fire of the Russians continues without cessation, day and night.

ITALY PREPARES FOR AN INVASION TENSION IS KEEN

Orders Given To Eight Battalions To Reinforce Troops at Libya in Readiness to Check Any Act of Austrian Aggression.

ENEMY MASSING ON FRONTIER BITTER HOSTILITY DISPLAY. D

Austrians Have Two Hundred Thousand Men on Italian Border and Hundred Thousand at Pola—Italian Workmen Attacked.

ROME, Dec. 7. 3.15 p.m.—Eight battalions of Italian troops have been ordered to Libya, to reinforce the troops there and according to the announcement, "to be ready for any aggression."

MILAN, via Rome, Dec. 6, 1.45 p.m.—(Delayed in transmission.)—A dispatch received from the Austrian frontier and published today in the "Tribuna" states that the statement of Premier Salandra in the Italian Parliament Thursday had an immediate echo in Austrian military circles. Friday night, the correspondent says, the railway lines poured troops all along the Italian border and also into Pola, the Austrian arsenal on the peninsula of Istria. It is estimated that 200,000 men were stationed along the Italian border and 100,000 at Pola.

At the same time, the correspondent continues, anti-Italian manifestations took place at various points. At Pragerhof, Hungarian soldiers spat in the faces of Italian workmen. Officers who witnessed these attacks did not interfere. At Stokabruck other soldiers ill-treated disabled Italian workmen who were making their headquarters in the station.

AUSTRIAN ARMIES WILL BE CUT OFF YSER'S LEFT BANK IN ALLIES' HANDS

Russians Are Rendering Impossible Any Retreat in Hungary. Good Progress Also Made in Northern France—"Offensive is Superior."

WHOLE ARMY IN DANGER PORTS ON COAST SAFE

Eight Hundred Thousand Men May Soon Be Made Prisoners. German Menace Believed to Have Been Lifted for Present.

ALAND ISLANDS AS NAVAL BASE

Russians Are Sending Warships There, as Other Ports Are Cut Off by Ice.

German and Austrian Navies Preparing for Joint Action

When German Ships Leave Kiel Canal Austrian Fleet Will Come Out of the Harbor at Pola.

ROME, Dec. 7.—The Stampa has received information from Pola that two German admirals have arrived in that town. It is asserted that Germany and Austria are preparing for simultaneous action by their fleets, and that when the German ships leave the Kiel Canal the Austrian fleet will come out of the harbor at Pola.

NEW ATTEMPT WILL BE MADE TO BREAK LINE

Violent Attack Expected From the Germans Fighting in Flanders.

CENTRED NEAR OSTEND

Heavy Reinforcements Are Moving Forward Constantly for the Battle.

AMSTERDAM, Dec. 7.—German attempts to regain ground recently captured by the allies in Flanders, in the last three days, have failed, and a new movement is believed to be going on within the Belgian border, according to a despatch to the Telegraph from its correspondent at Stius.

Cannonnading was plainly heard, beginning last Thursday, originating in the vicinity of Sonnebeke, five miles southwest of Ypres, and nine miles northwest of Roulers, where the German infantry tried to retake the hills recently captured by the allies. The telephone line between Bruges and Stius was cut by an English spy, who was shot at Bruges Saturday. Advice from Berlin came to the effect that it is generally believed that the Germans are preparing to make a new and violent attempt to break through the allies' left wing in Flanders. Reinforcements are constantly moving forward toward Ostend.

SERVIAN OFFENSIVE PROVED VICTORIOUS

ROME, Dec. 7.—The Servian offensive movement was victorious along the entire front, and the Servians captured over 5000 troops in the three days' fighting, according to an official announcement from Nish, the capital of Servia.

CONSERVATIVE IN DUNDAS PRESSED

Hilliard Elected by Seventy-Six in Late Premier's Riding—Majority Greatly Reduced.

WINCHESTER SPRINGS, Ont., Dec. 7.—By the comparatively small majority of 76, Irwin Hilliard, barrister of Morrisburg, the Conservative candidate, was elected to succeed the late Sir James Whitney as Dundas member of the Ontario Legislature. His opponent, John Campbell, of Ormond, made an unexpectedly close run. Conservatives attributed the big reduction in the party majority to lack of interest, as reflected in the light vote today. On June 23 last Sir James Whitney's majority was about 750. Campbell had a lead of 49 in Morrisburg, 19 in Ingersoll, 42 in Chesterville and 29 in Winchester Village.

PRESIDENT FALCONER IS LIABLE TO ARREST ON TREASON CHARGE IF EXCHANGE PLAN GOES THROUGH

LONDON HYDRO MANAGER WILL BE INVESTIGATED Charge is Made in City Council That Glauibitz Helped German Reservist to Leave.

LONDON, Ont., Dec. 7.—London city council tonight adopted a resolution introduced by Ald. F. G. Mitchell calling for an investigation of a charge that Gen. Manager H. J. Glauibitz of the public utilities commission, assisted Otto Becker, a German reservist and an employee of the commission, out of the country on the outbreak of hostilities. Becker is now fighting with the Kaiser's army. Ald. Mitchell recently introduced a resolution calling for the dismissal of General Manager Glauibitz because of the official's German birth.

BOMBS DROPPED ON HAZEBROUCK CROWD

Ten Persons Killed by Explosives From Taube Aeroplane.

LONDON, Dec. 7, 2.45 a.m.—A correspondent of The Central News in northern France tonight reported that an aeroplane, piloted by a German, dropped two bombs on Hazebrouck. The first hit a crowd of people, killing ten and wounding five civilians, including women and children.

RELEASE OF ADMIRAL OFFICIALLY ANNOUNCED

President Wilson's Appeal to Berlin on Need's Behalf Succeeded.

BERLIN, Dec. 7.—(By Wireless to London.)—It was announced officially today that the German Government, in releasing Rear Admiral Reginald Need, the retired British officer, on whose behalf President Wilson made representations to the German ambassador, had not asked England for any equivalent concession.

KING GEORGE HONORED NINE FRENCH GENERALS

PORTUGUESE TO FIGHT IN AFRICA

Four Thousand More Troops Ordered to Angola—Will Co-Operate With British.

LONDON, Dec. 7.—The government is preparing to send 4000 more troops to West Africa. Two thousand men were sent in September, 500 marines in October and another 500 marines are being fitted out for departure this month. It appears that Germany has armed great numbers of Portuguese African natives, which are commanded by German officers and provided with artillery. The prevailing view in Portugal appears to be that the most useful part Portugal can take in the war is to carry the war into the German colonies which are contiguous to the Portuguese.

PETROGRAD, Dec. 7.—That the German army loss in the recent fighting between the Warthe and Vistula Rivers 100,000 in killed and wounded, or one-fifth of their effective fighting force in that vicinity, is the statement of the newspaper Birzheviya Viedomosti. The article adds that the Russian victory near Lodz produced a crushing effect upon the morale of the German troops; that the German prisoners are most dejected and that several distinguished German generals narrowly escaped capture. Turkish officers, the newspaper says, were observed among the German troops. It is reported that these officers had come to see the Kaiser to confer with him regarding complaints that the Germans had not supplied ammunition for the German rifles issued to the Turkish troops.

FLEET BUSY ON BELGIAN COAST

Allies' Warships Again Shell German Positions—Enemy's Attacks on Trenches Repulsed.

LONDON, Dec. 7, 10.05 p.m.—Heavy firing was heard along the Belgian coast today, according to a Reuter despatch from Amsterdam, indicating that the warships of the allies again are bombarding the German positions. The Stius correspondent of The Heraldtribune says the Germans delivered violent attacks today on trenches recently captured by the allies, but were repulsed, and adds that the allies have made marked progress in the neighborhood of Langemark, Sonnebeke and Bixchoote. The Germans have been obliged to substitute lighter guns for their heavy artillery, as the inundations have made the use of the latter impracticable.
