IMPERIAL ASPECT OF BAHAMA FEDERATION

As a Part of Canada Would Further Great Partnership of Sister Nations in Empire.

MONTREAL, April 3.—Speaking before the Canadian Club this afternoon of the Bahamas and their desire to become a Canadian province, T. B. Macaulay, one of the Canadian promoters of the proposed federation, declared that the imperial aspect of the question was the most important of all.

"In making the Bahamas a part of Canada," said Mr. Macaulay, "we would be taking a long step forward in working out the destiny of Canada and the empire. I see a vision of the future in which the British Empire is a great federation of partnership of five great nations, Great Britain, Canada, Australia, South Africa and India, all of them independent in regard to their own affairs and yet all united in bonds of common loyalty and common interest. The union of detached and helpless colonies into the one or the other of these five great parts would be a move towards the consolidation of the empire. Everything that adds to the strength of one part adds to the strength of all the others."

"The acquisition of the Bahamas would help us to think imperially. The need of a substantial fleet to protect the trade routes of the world. The strategic importance of the Bahamas as a half-way-coaling station and a winter port for the vessels of the Canadian navy would be a powerful argument in favor of their acquisition."

PEACE CELEBRATION

W. L. Smith, editor of The Farmer's Review, addressed the Young People's Society of Alhambra-avenue Presbyterian Church last night on the place of peace in the world. The president of the society, Mr. Edgar Coulter, was chairman.

Mr. Smith said that Canada should use her influence to have the word "may" changed to "shall" with respect to the reference of waterways questions to the joint tribunal. The peace of Chile and Argentine, resulting from the arbitration of the dispute, should also be sought to keep all warships, including training ships, from inland waters.

ARBITRATION RESOLUTIONS.

LONDON, April 3.—American Ambassador Reid is receiving for presentation to the state department at Washington numerous resolutions adopted by the city and borough councils of the United Kingdom approving President Taft's suggestion of a complete Anglo-American arbitration.

BUGS TO FIGHT BUGS.

It is quite possible that anyone who happens to be stranded in the canyons of the high Sierras of California, any time between Christmas and Easter, might stumble upon two or three young men whose actions in those almost inaccessible solitudes would look very mysterious. He would see them gather up great mass of dead leaves and rubbish in places where the sun had melted, shift the finer material into burlap sacks, throw the leaves and sticks away, and then hasten on to a new location. If he were curious enough to follow the "mysterious" strangers, he would find that as soon as the bags were filled they were loaded upon the back of a patient mule, taken to the nearest railroad station and shipped to Sacramento.

Inquiry would probably elicit the statement that the young men were from the "State House," but the inference that they were escaped lunatics, if natural under the circumstances, would be altogether wrong. The "bug-house" is the name commonly applied to the California state insane asylum; and the method employed by those employed by the field agents of the insectary on expeditions for the collection of fly-bird beetles. For this reason its way of life is perfectly understood, and specimens which from time to time have been sent to the zoological gardens, never seen by visitors. It is an extraordinary-looking beast, with its broad face and large, naked ears. Altho its body is covered with a woolly undercoat, the outer fur is long and loose. The prevailing color of its hair is blackish brown. Its tail is bushy and of considerable length. Living singly or in pairs, the aye-aye passes the day asleep in a nest of its own construction.—Pall Mall Gazette.

JURY GAVE AWARD OF \$300

But Judge Morgan Reserved Judgment in Street Railway Suit.

Judgment was reserved by Judge Morgan in the case of Philip Copeland, the little lad who was run over by a street car on Gerrard-street bridge last December, and whose father is suing the street railway for \$500 damages for his son's death.

The jury's sealed verdict of last Friday's making was opened in court yesterday, showing an award of \$300 to the plaintiff. Judge Morgan sent the jury out to answer two questions: "How fast was the car going?" and "Do you consider the rate of speed excessive in view of all the circumstances?" The answers were that the car was going nine miles per hour, which the jury considered excessive. In sending the jury out to answer the questions, Judge Morgan declared it was to prevent further trial in case of appeal, but after the jury answered the questions, Judge Morgan reserved judgment further.

DANGERS ON FRONTIERS

Chinese Proclamation Declares Necessity for Great Army.

PEKING, April 3.—An imperial edict issued to-day in the name of the infant emperor assumes for him supreme command of the army and appoints the Prince Regent generalissimo until the emperor attains his majority.

The proclamation is the most important of a series of edicts, by which the throne has gradually raised the military standard, until the army, which was once the most despised profession, is now considered of the highest type.

It reviews at length the glorious history of the ancestors of the present dynasty, and intimates that dangers are lurking about the frontiers. It declares the necessity of a great army, and demands that the families discontinue selfishly seeking their own interests, and unite, as every family will suffer if conquered. It announces a new military programme.

If fulfilled, the proclamation will prove historic.

CALLOW YOUTH BROKE JAIL

Gordon Bowbeer from the Rural Parts Again in Police Net.
