TRADING NARROWS IN LOCAL MARKET

Buying of Preferred Shares and Investment Issues Chief Feature.

Altho the tone of Wall street yesterday was distinctly better, influenced by somewhat more reassuring advices from the western front, the Toronto market showed no quickening tendency. Dealings fell to the lowest total of the week, and a disposition to limit purchases to preferred stocks and issues of the purely investment class, such as bank shares, was marked in yesterday's transactions. Steel of Canada was easier, a few shares coming out at 58, or half a point below Thursday's closing. Canadian General Electric also weakened, selling at 102, and National Steel Car, in which the previous sale had been at 9, was marketed at 8. Two small lots of Brazilian sold at 85, an apparent advance of 1/2, but the gain was a nominal one, the stock being on offer later at 85 1/2 with bid. Cement preferred was at 92, and Steamships preferred at 75, was unchanged. Imperial Bank shares ruled at 186, at which level the minimum price, at which level the previous sale had been made, while Bank of Commerce and Dominion Bank remained at 140, and the other shares were again neglected, but steady. CIVIC POWER STRONG IN MONTREAL MARKET

Montreal, April 12.—Civic Power reached a new high for the movement, and the year, on the minimum price, being unchanged at 75 1/2, it went to 77 1/2. The closing bid was 77 1/2, and the market was at a half-point down, to 17 1/2, but recovered it, Textile sold off to 65, a loss of half a point.

NE IS CHEERFUL IN LONDON MARKET

London, April 12.—While there was little disposition to do business over the week-end, the stock market today maintained a cheerful tone. Consols improved and the war loan and other investment stocks were firmly maintained on light buying. Tin mines continued in favor, and Spanish bonds were the strongest features on the low exchange rate. Shipping shares were at a half-point down, to 17 1/2, but recovered it, Textile sold off to 65, a loss of half a point.

BANK OF GERMANY

Berlin, via London, April 12.—The statement of the Imperial Bank of Germany for the week ending April 6, shows the following changes: Cash and bullion increased 629,000 marks. Gold increased 197,000 marks. Treasury notes decreased 17,000,000 marks. Other securities decreased 2,000,000 marks. Bills discounted advanced 479,000 marks. Investments decreased 821,000 marks. Other securities increased 40,200,000 marks. Notes circulation decreased 40,761,000 marks. Deposits decreased 1,454,666,000 marks. Total gold holdings 2,477,721,000 marks.

Canadian Railway Earnings Show Material Improvement

Montreal, April 12.—Traffic earnings of the three principal Canadian railroads for the first week in April are reported to have increased 2.1 per cent. for the corresponding week a year ago of \$474,923 or 9.9 per cent. The increase for the last week in March was 6.6 per cent. for the first week in March 54 and for the first week in February 2.3.

Alien Enemy Plot Suspected In Decline of Liberty Four

New York, April 12.—New York Stock Exchange officials have sent out a questionnaire to members asking details of transactions in Liberty Bonds and second four per cent bonds on April 2, 3, 4 and 5. Reports have been current that the decline in the price of these securities was due to the sale of an enemy or speculative short-selling.

No More Time Extensions For Work on Mining Claims

J. J. St. Paul, president of the Northern Prospectors' Association, writes from South Porcupine as follows: "The Northern Prospectors' Association in receipt of a letter from the minister of lands, forests and mines to the effect that no more extensions of time will be granted for the permitting of assessment work upon mining claims. The association wishes to notify all its members as well as other claim holders of this ruling."

BIG BREAK IN COTTON

New York, April 12.—A break in the cotton market here this afternoon brought prices down from 30 to 27 points, or more than 1/4 a bale, under the heavy closing. July contracts sold as low as 25, and August 25 1/2. The decline presents a drop of approximately 112 a bale under the high mark of the season, south, and heavy southern selling, coupled with disquieting war news, were assigned reasons for the break. The continued decline from an earlier high of 32 1/2 contributed to improved crop prospects and decreased spot demand.
