Charles C. Browne was convicted in March, 1904, of having conspired to defraud the government by passing silks at underrated values, and sentenced to serve two years in Sing Sing Prison. He took an appeal to the United States circuit court of appeals, and lost. He then jumped his ball of \$12,500, and fied to Canada. The Canadian Government refused extradition on the conspiracy charge, but extradition on the conspiracy charge, but extradited Browne on an amended charge of being a fugitive from justice. A secret service agent started with Browne for New York from Justice. A secret service agent started with Browne for New York from Justice. A secret service agent started with Browne for New York from Montreal on July 26 last.

His attorneys expected that he would be brought to New York, but United States Marshal Henkel met them as Poughkeepsie and took the prisoner direct to Sing Sing Prison. Counsel for Frowne contended that he was practically kidnapped.

In his opinion discharging Browne from custody to-day, Judge Hough declared that there is no authority vested in the United States government to seize or hold a person extradited in pursuance of treaty provisions, except upon the charge of what the extradition was granted.
