ONTARIO NEVER CLAIMED

The Ontario legislature passed a resolution on March 9, 1882, favoring this, and Sir Oliver Mowat on Sept. 29, 1883, endorsed this. The memorial sums up by saying: "It is stoutly submitted that the foregoing shows conclusively, first, that the constitution and formation of the district of Keewatin was for temporary purposes only and with a view of ultimately embracing a large area thereof within the Province of Manitoba."

"Second, that the Province of Ontario, up to the time of the communication to Sir Wilfrid Laurier on March 22, 1895, claiming consideration for Ontario in any division of the Keewatin territory, never made any claim to any part of the said territory, but, on the other hand, heartily approved and rejoiced in the extension of the boundaries of Manitoba to the undisputed areas of Keewatin."

"It is noted that while Ontario and Quebec since confederation have doubled their areas, Manitoba in 1881 it is added that in 1881, when the population was 60,000, it was deemed just to extend the area of Manitoba and claims now are proportionately greater."

The memorial quotes a number of official communications from the Ontario government in 1882, 1884 and 1886, in which it was stated that the arrangement of 1884 would settle forever the western and northern boundaries of Ontario.

The memorial then points out that Keewatin was the only method of approach to Manitoba from the outside world for a long period and the development and administration of the territory can be better secured by Manitoba than by Ontario or Saskatchewan. The vital interest of Manitoba in the proposed Hudson Bay Railway is mentioned.

With regard to Saskatchewan, the memorial states that the districts of Assiniboia, Saskatchewan and Athabasca, out of which the Province of Saskatchewan was formed, had no connection with the district of Keewatin.

SUPPORTS REMOVED TOO SOON But No One Criminally Responsible for Collapse of Hotel.

Long Beach, Cal., Nov. 12.—The cause of the collapse of the Hotel Bixby last Friday, resulting in the death of ten men and the injury of a score of others, according to a score of the coroner's jury, as returned today, was the premature removal of the supports of the fifth floor and proceeding with the construction of the roof before the supporting cement had time to harden sufficiently. The jury decided that no individual was criminally responsible.

Contractor Spalding said that the exact cause of the collapse had not been disclosed. He declined to say what in his opinion caused the collapse. He said that the steel construction of the floors and beams for the floors were faultless and had nothing to do with the falling of the building. These were supplied by Kahn & Co. of Detroit, as was also the computation of strain upon the floor, but these features did not in any way contribute to the accident. The Detroit firm had nothing else to do with the construction of the building.

ROBBIN HAD NO KNOWLEDGE OF LAND DEAL WITH FOSTER

Did Not Know of Existence of Agreement and Says Pritchard Swore Falsely.

Ottawa, Nov. 12.—(Special.)—Hon. R. P. Roblin, premier of Manitoba, and the Hon. Colin Campbell, attorney-general, were on the stand before the insurance commission this afternoon. Mr. Roblin was asked to explain his connection with the Swan River deals and the Union Trust. He said he had nothing to amend in Mr. Whitte's evidence, but did take exception to statements made under oath by the Winnipeg land broker, A. W. Pritchard.

Pritchard had said witness knew that Mr. Foster had bought 40,000 acres, the Carrot River lands, from him. This witness never knew until he read this same evidence in the newspapers.

Mr. Tilley: "Was there a suggestion that Pritchard should sell these lands for you?" "None."

"Did you ever instruct him to come to Toronto?" "Never."

"Tell the commission how you came to sell the lands for the Union Trust."

"Pritchard was an accountant in the department of agriculture, as well as my private secretary, and he saw thru my letters to the department."

"But Mr. White produced this correspondence before the commission. 'That may be. The lands were in his name. I never had any papers. Never had a word of correspondence with Mr. Foster or the Union Trust.'"

"When shown the agreement with the Union Trust Co. for the purchase of the land Mr. Roblin betrayed some surprise. He never knew, he said, of the existence of any agreement. He thought all that was done was to make an assignment of the 40 sections and have the money for it."

"Pritchard said he was authorized by you to offer Mr. Foster a substantial commission."

"I never knew he was dealing with Mr. Foster."

"Well to whoever was purchasing. 'I never authorized him to give a commission to anybody.'"

"Have you anything else to remark about the evidence of Pritchard?" "I have. Pritchard said he left the service of the department of agriculture because he knew, he said, of the fact that he was not a member of the department. That is not true. I asked him to resign. He had been accountant for 22 years, and for over 12 there had been systematic stealing and embezzling in his department. When this was discovered by the auditor the guilty party had fled. I was not promoted. Pritchard was called into my office and examined. When the offender was arrested and Pritchard called to the attention of the department, anything he had said and remembered was made. So I told him if he could not remember better than that, he had better resign."

Contra-dicted Pritchard. Hon. Colin Campbell then came to the stand. He is president of the Ontario, Manitoba and Western Land Co., of which Mr. Bettes, a former witness, before the commission, is managing director. This company sold the so-called "Carrot River lands" to the Union Trust, Pritchard also being implicated.
