Why the Outfielder Makes Brilliant Catches Sporting Notes

Followers of baseball always contend that the outfield catches are more difficult in the diamond game than on the crease, and are negotiated because of superior ability of the basebah player as against the fielding skill of the cricketer. Curiously, Englishmen are generally credited with concurring in this idea. For finstance, a writer in a Yankee paper said the other day:

"Skilled English cricketers who see Americans play baseball are astonished
