BALLINGTON BOOTH WILL SEEK LEGAL ADVICE

Salvation Army Headquarters, in West Fourteenth street, throughout the day, was one of uncertainty. No one cared or dared to speak definitely about the situation. The effort was made to convince inquirers that all trouble was ended. But notwithstanding this there was a very evident nervous-ness on all sides concerning Commander Booth's promise to appear at Headquarters next Saturday and there make known his final dec.sion—"whether to surrender his accumulations in the name of the or-ganization, in the name of the Army, or to stand by his rights and organize a new army with the property which would belong to those who remained faithful to the American branch.

Major and Mrs. Glen Resign.

The one important feature was the resignation of Major Peter Glen and his wife. Major Glen has been in charge of the field department, and was one of the most powerful officers in the work. The couple sent a letter to Eva Booth, in which they state that their reason for their resignation, in brief, was that they believed that Commander and Mrs. Ballington Booth had been dismissed from the ranks without a just cause. He said in regard to the reports that a large sum of money had been offered to Mr. and Mrs. Booth to carry on any work they might desire, that they were in a measure true. A committee of prominent citizens had made such offers, but who they were he would not say.

French and Brazilians Said to be Fighting in the Disputed Territory.

Paris, Feb. 26.—The Politique Coloniale publishes a telegram addressed to M. Ettenne, member of the Chamber of Deputes for Algeria, purporting to have come from M. Coubreau, French Consul at Para. The despatch says that conflicts have taken place between the French and the Brazilians in the disputed territory, and that the French have destroyed half of the town of Mapa, losing in the conflict a hundred men killed and wounded. The Politique Coloniale expresses doubt as to the genuineness of the telegram.
