THE ANXIETY IS OVER NOW.

Gen. White's Message From Ladysmith Says That Gen. Yule's

London, Oct. 25.—The War Office this evening made public the following despatch sent by General White from Ladysmith at 8.50 this afternoon:

"The advance guard of the force sent from Glencoe to intercept the retreat of the Boers from Elandslangte, were cut off by the enemy. Under Sergt. Baldrey they brilliantly fought their way across the Biggarsberg, the enemy pursuing and firing at them at a range of 300 yards along the passes. They arrived here at 10 o'clock this morning. Three of the troopers are missing, owing to the break-down of their horses. The Boers used a Maxim. A lieutenant of the Hussars with a party was driven back to Glencoe. The Hussars were fired at as far down as Mod-

While the British officials do not conceal their knowledge of German, French and Russian antagonism, and their irritation thereat, they do not give the slightest hint that European hostility will crystallize into any probable overt act. But the beilef that Great Britain is on the verge of a crisis, or even a conflict far greater than that in the Transvaal, has many supporters, though the lack of all official confirmation favors the conservative views that the rethough the lack of all official confirmation favors the conservative views that the remarkable military and naval activity is due to a desire to take thorough precautions, which, though ominous, have at present no special bearing upon Great Britain's European relations.

Advices from the Continent strengthen this view. For instance, The Fremdenblatt of Vienna to-day says: "Nothing points to the eventual intervention of Europe in favor of the Boers."

The paper adds that Germany especially has resolved "not to depart from her attitude of neutrality."




