JAPANESE FORCE FIGHTING

DR. SPROULE NOT RETIRING

Engagement Between the Big Armies Now General West of Railroad.

Gunhu Pass, May 24.—It is feared that a considerable body of Russian cavalry and infantry has been cut off by the Japanese southeast of Shantung. When heard from on Sunday night they had been forced to cross the west bank of the Liao River near Fakuken and compelled to attempt their escape by the road, which crosses the west bank of the Liao River near Fakuken.
