Rennes, Aug. 3.-The witnesses summoned in behalf of Capt. Alfred Dreyfus include Capt. Lebrun-Renault, to whom the prisoner is alleged to have made a confession which has since been denied; Senator Scheurer-Kestner, formerly vice-president of the senate; M. Trarieux, formerly minister of justice; M. Bourgeois, formerly premier and minister of the interior; Maj. Hartmann, of the 22nd Artillery; Capt. Freystaetter, Maj. Forzinetti, and other officers and journalists. It is also said MM. Labori and Demange will invite the court martial to examine by commission all persons alleged by Quesnay de Beaurepaire to be able to prove the guilt of Dreyfus in order

to throw the fullest light on the af-The Pall Mall Gazette says that the choice of Salle de la Manutention at Rennes as the place of holding the Dreyfus court martial is a veritable calamity. The ceiling of the room is low, being only 8½ feet high, and nobody except the members of the court and the witnesses will be able to hear a word. The journalists will be ranged in sixteen rows behind the witnesses, and owing to the execrable acoustics of the hall, only those in the first row or two can hope to follow the proceedings, making it practically impossible to report the trial. There is still time, the Gazette says, to change the place of trial to the Lycee, which is close to the prison, and handy in other respects, as well as being commodious and comfortable, and it is ped the authorities will listen to the

prayers of the press for this change. A CONTINENTAL KICK. M. Delcasse, minister, of foreign affairs, has gone to St. Petersburg to return the visit of Count Muravieff. It is reported that Delcasse proposes to arrange the details of the czar's visit to the Paris Exhibition of 1900, and newspapers intimate that he may raise the question of continental action in the event of Great Britain de-

claring war against the Transvaal.

The Republique Francaise renews the attack on the Franco-American treaty, declaring reductions obtained on French products are insignificant, while France, it adds, has granted considerable concessions, entailing large industrial sacrifices, especially,

for example, on machinery. There is no truth in the statement published by a New York newspaper today that strained relations exist between Russia and France owing to President Loubet having failed to telegraph to the czar his condolences on the death of the czarewitch. The president did telegraph expressions of sympathy to the czar upon the occasion referred to, and also sent a wreath to be deposited on the tomb of

the czarewitch. Various rumors are in circulation regarding the reason of M. Delcasse's visit to St. Petersburg. One has it that the foreign minister's visit is connected with rapprochement between France and Germany and the declining health of the Austrian emperor.
BELGIANS ANXIOUS.

London, Aug. 3.—Premier Van den Peereboom and the Belgian cabinet resigned because of the rejection in committee of the government's electoral bills. With the fall of Premier Van den Peereboom the Ultramontane party has been overthrown, and the turn has come for the Moderate Catholics, who probably will soon be superseded by a

semi-Liberal, semi-Socialist cabinet. Belgium is going to try proportional representation, so that parliament may be the absolute mirror of public opin-ion. At least, such is the platform of the new cabinet, which M. de Smet de

Naeyer is called on to form. The question is whether the present parliament provides a sufficient majority for passing such a reform bill. There is a regular split on the question in the Clerical party, many of whom will not hear of the representation of minorities. There is also a

GEN. PAREJA'S DEFENSE. Madrid, Aug. 3.-Counsel for Gen. The other officers advanced a similar defense. The judgment of the court-martial was deferred.

WILLIE MAY WED. It is generally believed that the act of Willie Waldorf Astor in becoming a British subject will be followed before long by the announcement of his engagement to Lady Randolph Churchill. formerly Miss Jennie Jerome, of New York. Having been naturalized under the general act of 1870, Astor's children-Waldorf Astor, John Jacob Astor and Miss Pauline Astor-automatically become British subjects also. Astor originally intended to obtain naturalization by a special act of parliament, but was warned that such ship. procedure would probably evoke opposition. His application, therefore proceeded in the regular manner. He paid the following fees: Twenty-five dollars on receiving the certificate naturalization, \$2 50 for a copy of the

certificate. \$2 50 for his registration, \$50 in counsel fees; total, \$80.

HAVE GONE TOO FAR During the debate in the House of Commons on the colonial loans bill, Mr. Chamberlain said, in regard to the government of the West Indies, that the constitutional rights should not pe further extended, adding that in some cases it was evident they had already gone too far, and the electors did not care for their privileges, claiming that the "so-called liberal constitutions were nothing more or less than oligarchies.'

A PRIVY COUNCIL DECISION. London, Aug. 3.—The judicial committee of the Privy Council has allowed the appeal of the Queen, as represented by the Government of the Province of Quebec, against the judgment of the court of Queen's Bench appeal side, in favor of L. J. Demers, of Quebec. for damages arising out of the cancellation of a contract for certain government printing. The decision is founded upon the fact that no subsequent order-in-council was passed affirming the action of the provincial secretary in entering into the contract. The points of constitutional law decided by the lower courts are not passed upon by the decision, which is founded upon a ground raised for the first time in the argument before the Privy Council.
