"The History of Printing," by Mr. John Clyde Oswald, editor of the American Printer, New York City. Mr. Oswald is an artistic printer for art's sake. The address will be illustrated by 60 lantern slides.

"Growing a System," by Mr. Justus A. Griffin, of the Griffin & Kidner Company, Hamilton. A talk on methods.

## WHO OWNS QUEEN CITY

Street Railway Lay Tracks Without Permission and City Tears Them Up.

Toronto, May 17.—Another dispute has commenced between the city of Toronto and the street railway. Yesterday afternoon, without waiting for permission from the city, the street railway started to put a curve in from Queen street to the new Scarborough Amusement Park. The work was partially completed when the city became aware of what was going on and sent police officers, who stopped all operations. This morning a force of men was sent from the city engineer's office and the rails put down yesterday were torn up. The street railway company claims that under the recent judgment of the privy council it can put down curves and loops wherever it pleases, and this last trouble will probably lead to an interpretation of the judgment.

## TOLSTOI, JUN., ACQUITTED.

St. Petersburg, May 18.—Count Leo Leonovitch Tolstoi, son of the famous author, who was arrested in February last, charged with high treason in publishing his father's latest political pamphlet, has been acquitted. The court decided that the count had no criminal intent in republishing the pamphlet, which was printed abroad, but ordered the Russian edition to be burned and the plates destroyed.

## YOUNG FARMER KILLED.

Lucknow, May 17.—James Torrance, the eldest son of Mr. Peter Torrance, near this village, met death this morning while engaged roiling in a field. No one saw the accident, but it is supposed the horses, possibly frightened by a passing train, became unmanageable and ran away. When found Mr. Torrance was alive, but unconscious, and died shortly after. He was about 24 years old.

largely to one man—a record without parallel in the trotting world. He also trained and campaigned such cracks as Monte Carlo, Expressive, Bolivar, Flying Jib, Consuela S., and Monroe Chief. Salisbury was one of the first trainers to discover that speed was better made by a short toe than a long one. The severity of the preparations he gave his horses was in some cases almost cruel, and although he got results it was usually at the expense of the horse's vitality.

Quintell and Johnny are entered in the 2:15 trot at Cleveland, and are the sole Canadian entries in this stake. If she trains on the horse to best here is Sonoma Girl. She has been entered right down the line, and it will probably be either a melon or a lemon with her trainers. She is about the most highly-tried green mare that ever started, and barring unsoundness seems a certain winner. Her sire, Lynwood W., by Guy Wilkes, is likely to become a sensational speed begueter. The first foal he ever got was Charley Edden, 2:08½, one of the best campaigners last year in the west. Sonoma Girl that trotted a trial in 2:07 on Christmas Day, is the third foal. Three other foals raised by the same man that bred these cracks have taken records from 2:15 to 2:22, and as they are the only Lynwood W. foals old enough to train, the horse's mark as a sire is already made. He is in California, and a lot of his stock is now coming to hand and will be carefully trained.

Ed. Sunderlin, the New England

trainer, who drove Angus Pointer to his record of 2:02½, will handle the other fast Canadian side-wheelers Texas Rooker, 2:05¼, this year.

John A. Chantler, of Toronto, has entered his pacer, Lady May, 2:04¼, in the free-for-all at Providence.
