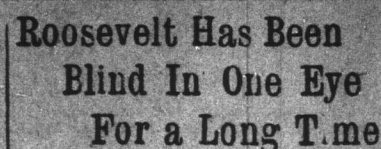


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Stamford, Conn., Oct. 22.—Col. Theodore Roosevelt, who is finishing a fortnight's training at a rest camp here yesterday received a delegation of newspapermen and announced to them that he had been ordered to leave the Atlantic City pistol that he was canceling speaking engagements on the advice of a physician, was incorrect. The colonel stated that his stay at the camp was simply for relaxation. He expects to return to his duties in a few days.

Controller Wants Agricultural Supplies Under National Law.

ROME, Saturday, Oct. 20.—The first week's session of Parliament ended
