Found Not Guilty of Prescribing Booze in Contravention of Act.

WAS TRICKED INTO IT

Evidence Showed Elgin Man Got Prescription by Using Warden's Name.

The ease with which a physician may be tricked by an unscrupulous person bent on getting liquor by means fair or otherwise was brought to light in police court today when Dr. James D. Wilson was found not guilty of having issued a liquor prescription to Frank McNicholl, a Yarmouth Township farmer.

The charge was laid under section 51 of the Ontario temperance act, which reads: "Did give a medical prescription to be used in evasion of the act." The charge was laid as the result of McNicholl having been arrested a week ago at St. Thomas and convicted on a charge of drunkenness. County Magistrate Hunt of St Thomas, Walter Ross, inspector of Elgin County, and Vice-Chairman Dingman of the Ontario license, commission were in count to ense commission were in court to hear the case.

McNicoll testified that he came to the

McNicoll testified that he came to the city and was wandering down Carling street. He wandered into Dr. Wilson's office. He got the prescription on his representation that he needed it for his father, James McNicoll.

Dr. Wilson testified that McNicoll told him that he lived in Westminster Township and that he needed the liquor for his father, who was sick in bed with bronchitis and heart failure. Dr. Wilson declined for some time to give the prescription, but when McNicoll informed him that Warden Archie Blaikie had sent him in, he made out the pre-Methodist Church last evening, Rev. Dr. formed him that Warden Archie Blaikle had sent him in, he made out the prescription in the name of James McNicoll, the father, and made no charge. Crown Attorney McKillop recalled McNicoll, who substantiated Dr. Wilson's story to the effect that no charge had been made Mr. McKillop asked McNicholl if he knew Archie Blaikle, the warden of Middlesex, and witness replied he had never heard of such a man.



One of the Australian soldiers told the police of how he became acquainted with his fellow-prisoners, one of whom on the night of the affray said the third man had gone with two Canadian "goats," meaning "mugs," and further stated that these Canadians were enticed to the place where the attack was made by a bottle of whiskey. When he produced the money to pay for it deceased was hit and was searched for his money as soon as he dropped. The prisoners were rmanded.
