

CANADA GIVES ON WAR BREAD DOMINION DAY

Corn, Oats, Barley, Rice, Potatoes, Etc., Must Be Mixed
With White or Standard Flour—One Pound to Nine
Till July 15, Then One Pound to Four.

OTTAWA, June 25.—Compulsory use by bakers, confectioners, public eating houses and private households of substitutes for wheat flour is prescribed in an order issued today by the Canada food board.

In making this measure public, Mr. Thomson emphasized the absolute necessity for conserving our stock of wheat, in order that we may share it with our allies, especially during the next few months, when their food situation will be extremely difficult.

The order defines as substitutes for wheat flour "pure and wholesome corn, oats, barley, rice, rye, buckwheat, tapioca or potato flour; bran, shorts, oatmeal, rolled oats, cornmeal, cornstarch, hominy, corn grits, rye meal, or any mixture of same and potatoes."

Four pounds of potatoes will be considered equivalent to one pound of the other substitutes.

IN EFFECT JULY 1.

The order provides that on and after July 1, bakers, confectioners and public eating places, in making any bakery products in which the use of substitutes in certain definite proportions is not prescribed by previous orders of the food board, must use one pound of substitutes to every nine pounds of standard wheat flour.

Similarly, persons baking for private consumption any product in which white or standard flour is used, must use not less than one pound of substitutes to every nine pounds of white or standard wheat flour.

On and after July 15, this proportion, so far as places east of Port Arthur are concerned, must be increased to one pound of substitutes to every four pounds of white or standard flour.

The quantities of substitutes available west of Port Arthur are at present too uncertain to allow a date being named for an increase equal to that required for Eastern Canada, but such increase will be made just as soon as the available supply of substitutes in Western Canada warrants.

On and after July 15 no licensed dealer may legally have in his possession for sale any wheat or standard flour, unless he also has at all times a sufficient stock of substitutes to meet the demands of his customers at reasonable prices.

LABELLED "VICTORY BREAD."

On and after July 15 every baker must place on each loaf of bread a label or sticker bearing his name and address and the words "Victory Bread." The latter explanation will be a guarantee that the bread is made from the amount of substitute for standard wheat flour required by the Canada food board has been used in making the loaf. Bread which does not bear such label or sticker may be seized and forfeited to the government.

The order makes it an offence for any person to sell or have in his possession any bread, rolls, pastry or any other product in which white or standard wheat flour is used, which does not conform to the requirements of the food board. The penalty on violation of the new regulation is a fine of not less than \$100 and up to \$1,000, or imprisonment for a period of three months, or both fine and imprisonment.

SMALL CABINET CIRCLE REMAINING IN OTTAWA IN REAL DOMESTIC SQUABBLE

Machin Case Considered Much
Same as That of Maurice—
Ministers Are Wondering
What To Say.

OTTAWA, June 25.—The highly sensational and startling interview given out by Lieut.-Col. Machin, responsible head of the military service council, member of the Ontario Legislature and chancellor of the Anglican Diocese of Algoma, in Montreal yesterday, has created a situation in Ottawa which may result in a very acute cabinet quarrel on his hands when he does return.

With the prime minister and three of his cabinet overseas, and with two more going, those who are left behind appear to be implicated in a real domestic squabble.

The situation of the acting prime minister, Hon. C. J. Doherty, has for the past fortnight been diverted almost wholly from important matters of state to consideration of a controversy, of which he himself is the centre, and which is almost entirely religious in character. That those who have wholly supported the government at the head of whose council board Mr. Doherty's ministry makes the situation all the more extraordinary.

Ontario Members' Work.

And it is still the fact that the very thing of which exception has been taken in the Guelph affair—namely the exemption of Roman Catholics from the military service act in discrimination against Protestant students of the military service act—has been the subject of the attitude taken in the House of Government by Ontario members on the one side, and the striking out of the words "divinity students" from the list of exemptions, and insisted upon limiting them to clergy and members of recognized orders.

The Machin Interview.

Then follows the famous interview of Lieut.-Col. Machin, in which he accuses two of the cabinet—General McEwen and Hon. A. L. Sifton—of being part of a cabal to oust the minister of justice (who is the only Catholic in a cabinet of 23), which designates the affair as a disgraceful affair, and which charges the militia department with an attempt to renege on its obligations to the powers of the military service council. He further declares that a religious controversy at the present time must militate against any kind of service.

A whole day has passed, and there is silence from the government.

It is tonight stated that the militia department will have nothing to say on the matter, and that any reply which is made by Mr. Doherty in his capacity of acting prime minister and head of the department of which Col. Machin is an official, will be "interviewed" further by the Guelph press tomorrow, though there are no indications that he intends to retract anything he has said. Col. Machin, it may be recalled, is Conservative M.P. in the local Ontario House.

Meanwhile the country's business is expected to go on with no interruption and three of his colleagues in England; with two more of them going on holiday on the Bay of Chaleur; with the solicitor-general, Mr. Borden, on his way to the Rotunda club somewhere in the west; with Mr. Doherty, and with the few remaining in Ottawa implicated in a wretched controversy.

CHATHAM—Friends held a surprise party for Sgt. William Murdoch, one of the "original" First, and presented him with a wrist watch. He is home on furlough, after nearly four years in the trenches. A brother, Pte. John Murdoch, was killed. Both left Chatham in August, 1914.

George Allison of Chatham, who was severely burned while extinguishing a fire in the clothes of a child, succumbed to his injuries yesterday.

A lad giving the name of Elgie Lodge, died in Chatham on the charge of stealing an automobile from Belle River. It is suspected that he is the person that stole a Ford in London and left it in the ditch near Stoney Point.

Dr. Colin McCarthy, aged 63, a lifelong resident of Sarnia, died at his home there yesterday. The funeral will be held on Friday.

OTTAWA, June 25.—Ernest R. Rogers, secretary of the International Bible Students' Association here, was today fined \$100 on one charge and allowed suspended sentence on another for having in his possession copies of the Bible Students' Monthly and "The Messenger" literature banned by the censor under the war measures act.

In allowing Rogers to go with the light sentence Magistrate Askwith declared that he was going to put a stop to the distribution of this literature and would mete out very severe punishment to any others found guilty of a similar offence.

CRUSHED BY CRANE.

HAMILTON, June 25.—Joseph Heketh, 35 years of age, married, and the father of three small children, employed as an electrician at the plant of the International Harvester Company, was crushed to death today, when a 60-ton crane passed over his body. It took two

hours to get the remains from under the big crane.

NEW PREMIER FOUND AND AUSTRIAN CABINET HAS BEEN INDUCED TO STAY

AMSTERDAM, June 25.—Vienna newspapers received here say that Ministers of Railways Bauhaus will succeed Dr. von Seydler as premier of Austria. It is asserted by the newspapers that the other members of the cabinet who tendered their resignations from von Seydler have been induced to remain.

FAST GERMAN RAIDER IN WEST INDIA WATERS

NORFOLK, Va., June 25.—Reports of the presence of a fast and heavily armed German raider in West Indian waters were brought here today by masters of vessels arriving from Central and South America ports.

The ship is said to be of the cruiser type with a rapid build and clean lines.

The fact that the raider made no effort to attack at least two vessels which sighted her led the captains to believe that she is a "mother ship" for submarines which recently were operating off the Atlantic coast.

PRESCRIBED THOUSAND QUARTS OF WHISKY IN PERIOD OF 12 DAYS

TORONTO, June 25.—Dr. H. H. Moorehouse, aged 70, a well-known Toronto physician, was today fined \$1,200 and costs, under the Ontario temperance act. The evidence showed that the defendant had issued prescriptions for 1,114 quarts of whisky and other liquors within twelve days, and that he charged \$1 for each prescription. He offered no defence to the charge and will pay the fine.

HERTLING BLAMES WILSON FOR HOLDING HIS TONGUE

AMSTERDAM, June 25.—Speaking in the Reichstag today Imperial Chancellor Count von Hertling said:

"I said that these four points of President Wilson's terms might possibly form the basis of a general world peace. No utterance of President Wilson's whatever followed this. So that there is no object in spinning any further the threads there started."

CADET WEIR KILLED IN ACCIDENT AT BORDEN

Camp Borden, Ont., June 25.—Cadet and Third Air Mechanic H. R. Weir of the Royal Air Force died here as a result of injuries received in an airplane accident this evening when on a solo flight near Borden. His next of kin is Mrs. G. F. Weir, Trail, British Columbia.
