## **LETTER WRITER SAID BISHOP FALLON WAS** HOARDING UP COAL

Fuel Controller Finds He Has Only 23 Tons.

Fuel Controller J. W. McCallum had a long letter this morning, calling his attention to an alleged coal "hog" in the city. The letter first referred to the possible investigation of cellars in the city, and then followed with the exposure. The letter referred to was none other than the Right Rev. M. F. Fallon. The letter stated that not only was the cellar at the bishop's home on Central avenue full, but that outhouses were also packed. It stated that Finney & Shannon had "numerous" teams drawing coal to the residence of the bishop for over a week. It added that 100 tons could be easily removed from the hishop's premises, and he would not miss it.

Mr. McCallum has been running down many such reports. He does not delay when a complaint is made to him, and the latest was no exception. His inquiry showed that last year Bishop Fallon had used 35 tons of egg and one ton of stove coal. So far this year he has had delivered nineteen tons of egg and four tons of chestnut coal. In other words he had 23 tons of coal, and his requirements are 36 tons.

"It's just like a case I had up north," said Mr. McCallum. "I was told that a person had a cellar full, and the side of the barn bursting out with coal. I investigated and found six tons of coal in the barn and not a pound in the cellar."


FOR BIG CAMPAIGN Has Been at the Front Since May, 1917.

Sad news reached Mr. and Mrs. An-All Set For Opening of Trade drew Robson, 289 Oxford street, this morning. It was a message from the director of records, Ottawa, announcing that their only son, Thomas Charlton Robson, had been killed in action on September 27.

Pte. Robson enlisted in London with a Middlesex battalion and went overseas as sergeant in the paymaster's office. After he had been in England a short time, he wrote his mother that there were lots of young men returning from the front wounded who could handle his job easily, and he feit that he ought to make an effort to reach the front with the fighting units. He did so, and underwent an operation in England to fit himself that he might pass the medical test to cross to France. This he succeeded in doing in May, 1917, and had been up in front ever since with a Toronto Highland unit. This is the first time his name has appeared in the casualty list.

Pte. Robson was well known and popular in London. Prior to enlisting he was a member of the staff of the local branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia. Andrew Robson, the father, was last night re-elected president of the Liberal Club.
