## DEATH TOLL OF EXPLOSION MAY BE INCREASED

Two of Those Injured in Port  
Colborn Accident Likely  
To Die.

### FUNERALS OF VICTIMS

Four Buried at St. Catharines  
—Efforts To Recover  
Bodies Fail.

ST. CATHARINES, Aug. 11.—All efforts to recover the bodies of Alfred Beck and Sidmouth Dunslop, missing since the explosion at the Port Colborn Government elevator on Saturday night, have been unsuccessful. No doubt is entertained as to their fate, however. Relays of rescue gangs are continuing the work of pumping grain and water out of the hold of the barge Quebec and in clearing the concrete and steel wreckage.

It is feared that the death toll of ten may be increased by two. Arthur Montreuil, one of the crew of the Quebec, is in a serious condition, and little hope is held out for his recovery. S. Mouch, an employee of the elevator, who was engaged in loading the barge, was severely burned, and his condition tonight is regarded as critical.

Captain Hector Latour, his wife and family, and the members of the crew, with the exception of Montreuil, left tonight for Montreal. The same train carried the remains of Joseph Latour, brother of Captain Latour.

Funerals of four of the victims took place today.

## LENINE TO RETIRE AS BOLSHEVIK HEAD

Reported To Have Asked Min-  
ister To Reach Agreement  
With Moderates.

COPENHAGEN, Aug. 11.—Premier Lenine, it is rumored, intends to retire from the head of the Bolshevik Government, according to dispatches from Helsingfors, quoting Russian reports.

Strikes are reported to be raging everywhere in Bolshevik-controlled territory. One hundred and fifty strike leaders were said to have been executed.

Pending his actual withdrawal, Premier Lenine was reported to have instructed Herr Krasin, minister of railroads, to try to reach some understanding with the Mensheviks, the moderate opposition party.

The strikes, which have been becoming more and more violent, are spreading in spite of the Government's intervention.

Peasants are said to be refusing to deliver grain to the cities, causing the Government great embarrassment and adding new difficulties to problems of provisioning.

## Aviator Carries Ope a Soprano As a Passenger

Miss Anna Case Travels From  
New York To Pough-  
keepsie by Plane.

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., Aug. 11.—Major Sydney E. Parker, British aviator, landed here from New York at 5:45 on his way to New Orleans by way of the great Lake Erie. He was carrying as a passenger to Poughkeepsie Miss Anna Case, the opera soprano, who was taken out at Mamaroneck.

Major Parker will be joined at Saratoga by Capt. Wilcox, recently of the British air service.

## SEDITIONARY PAPERS SEIZED BY POLICE IN LONDON SUBURB

LONDON, Aug. 11.—(By the Associated Press.) Seditious documents were seized by the police today in a raid on London's western suburb of Acton. The papers captured dealt with a suggested seizure of arms and ammunition from the military stores by revolutionaries and the establishment of a Soviet government in London.

## UNLAWFUL COMBINE KEEPS SUGAR PRICE UP, SUPPLY DOWN

Those in Control Have Taken  
Advantage of Oppor-  
tunities.

### PERNICIOUS CONSPIRACY

Cost of Living Commissioner  
Makes Some Startling  
Statements.

OTTAWA, Aug. 11.—"Sugar supplies in Canada are being artificially restricted and sugar prices are being unlawfully advanced by combines and conspiracies which are absolutely pernicious and unlawful," is the statement of Dr. R. J. McFall, cost-of-living commissioner. "Now that the season is here when the housewife should be assured that she will get the best of her money, she is being deceived and the consumer still more dependent upon the big combining combine."

For several weeks the dealer has been experiencing great difficulties in getting sugar to supply his retail customers. The dealer has been a few strikers at the refineries which have helped to cause a stringency, and on top of these other refineries have seized upon the same time to close down their plants and to demand a rate in excess of the market. He has been blaming the shortage of refined sugar on excessive exports, but this is absolutely untrue as shown by the facts.

More Than Enough.

"The latest available customs reports show that the excess of our imports over our exports is very much greater than usual; the sugar coming into Canada to stay is sufficient to supply decidedly more, not less, than our customary requirements. In spite of labor difficulties and well-timed closing of plants, sugar has been sold lately in Canada at a rate in excess of our requirements. Yet we have a shortage of sugar in the market. The price of sugar in the market is now the world's clearing house for sugar."

"When the market price in Montreal advances 55 cents a hundred pounds the price of all sugar in the hands of the refiners, wholesalers and many of the retailers advances also, even on the large quantities in storage. Some refiners have already advanced their prices for the sole reason that they are profiteers. This is not general, for most of our refiners are good citizens. Moreover, there is no general combine among the refiners. It would be unwise to make prices in common."

Vicious Combine.

"There is, however, a vicious combine before the sugar reaches the retailers, and there is a powerful weapon in operation to keep the prices on the rise. The combine is a substantial discount to wholesalers provided they maintain the common price set by the combine; if prices are cut, the discount is not received. Under such conditions the advance in price on all major holdings is inevitable."

"This combine promotes the welfare of the large business interests, but it is destroying the good old-fashioned custom of household preserving, and is bleeding the pocket of the ordinary citizen. It is a few weeks ago one of the large refiners, whose stock is held at its own price, had its annual meeting that its profits for the last year had doubled."

## WESTERN FARMER IS NOT FREE - TRADER —PREMIER MARTIN

Wants Free Implements, But  
Not To Disrupt Trade  
Equilibrium.

[Special To The Advertiser.]  
KITCHENER, Aug. 11.—The western farmer isn't a free trader, but merely wants a reduction on farm machinery and is quite willing to let the eastern manufacturer work out his own destiny as far as the tariff is concerned, according to Premier William Martin of Saskatchewan, who is visiting his brother, J. A. Martin, manager of the Dominion Farmers' Union here.

The manufacturers of Canada need have no alarm regarding the tariff reduction, as that is not the intention of the Saskatchewan premier, as the farmers there are only concerned with the reduction of the price of farm implements.

No Desire to Disrupt.

"They have no desire to disrupt the equilibrium of trade or commerce, but feel that they have a natural right to consideration in connection with the obtaining of the implements used in the gaining of their livelihood. The great point which Premier Martin insisted upon in connection with the western farmer is that he is not a free trader."

Speaking of the convention at Ottawa, from which he had just come, Premier Martin stated that he was satisfied with the outcome. He expressed the view that the Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, the new leader, was a man of great ability and one upon whom the Liberals could unite. He was of the firm belief that Mr. King would unite the Liberal party of Canada, and that all sides here would rally to the standard that will be upheld by the former minister of labor.

He stated that Mr. King, as well as having unusual ability and youth in his favor, while not having the experience of a leader, was a fighter. He would bring into the office of leader a wide and sympathetic knowledge of labor and economic conditions and an energy which would place the Liberal party in strongest favor with the rank and file of the Dominion.

Speaking on crop conditions in his province, he stated that the wheat in the southwestern portion of the province was in bad condition, but that other sections of the province were not so badly off.

## Wilson Has Refused To Send Letter on Shantung to Senate

Says It Contains Confidential  
Reference to Other  
Governments.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—President Wilson today refused to send the Senate a copy of General Bili's letter concerning the Shantung settlement on the ground that it contained confidential references to other governments.

## BORDEN TO ACCOMPANY ROYAL PARTY TO QUEBEC

OTTAWA, Aug. 11.—Sir Robert Borden has accepted an invitation to accompany the Prince of Wales and his party on shipboard from St. John to Quebec. The intervening points of call will be Halifax and Charlottetown.

## POLISH TROOPS ARE DEFEATING BOLSHEVIKI

Entered Minsk Last Friday  
After Two Weeks'  
Hard Fighting.

### COUNTER-ATTACKS FAIL

Bolsheviki Unable To Arrest  
Converging Movement,  
Says Report.

LONDON, Aug. 11.—(By the Associated Press.) Polish forces, entering Minsk, capital of the Russian province of the same name, last Friday after a fortnight of heavy fighting, according to an official statement issued by the war office tonight.

The Bolsheviks, despite strong counter-attacks, were unable to arrest the Polish converging movement on the city from the west and Vitebsk on the north.

The Polish offensive, north of the Pinsk marsh, is also progressing favorably, the statement adds.

## INFORMAL DRAFT OF LEAGUE COVENANT FOR SENATE CTEE.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—President Wilson today sent to Chairman Lodge the informal draft of the League of Nations covenant prepared by the American commission at Paris, and also the formal report of the commission on the League of Nations.

The president wrote Mr. Lodge that it would not be possible to comply with the committee's request for the documents mentioned in the American peace commissioners in Paris in negotiating the peace treaty.

"The various data bearing upon or used in connection with the treaty of peace with Germany," said the president, "are so miscellaneous and enormous in mass that it would be impossible for me to supply them without bringing from Paris the whole file of the commission itself, and would include many memoranda which it was agreed, on grounds of policy, it would be unwise to make use of outside the conference."
