C., Oct. 16.—The fate of the industrial conference hangs on the outcome of the efforts of the committee of fifteen to reach an agreement on collective bargaining, representatives of the three groups, public, labor and capital, declared today. Several conferences said that unless both capital and labor showed a spirit of compromise the conference might as well announce frankly that agreement could not be reached and adjourn.
