Normal School Has 16
Male Students This Year

Attendance at the normal school this
year does not show a total increase
over previous years, because it was
not affected to a great extent during
the year. This representation, accord-
ing to the institute's officials, has been
taxed to its utmost every year for a
considerable period, and this is not an
exception.

The total attendance at present is 193
students, 17 of whom are males. The
male attendance, although very
small, has increased this year, however,
from a total number of six last year to
sixteen for 1919.

The school curriculum is reported to
be running smoothly.

**AUSTRIAN ASSEMBLY IS

Special Committee to Make Report by
End of Week.

Vienna, Oct. 15.—Austria's National
Assembly met today for consideration
of the peace treaty framed by the peace
conference at Paris and signed at St.
Germain on September 10 last. The
treaty was referred to a special com-
mittee, the Government program being
carried out in an uneventful session.

It is probable that the treaty com-
mittee will make its report by the end
of the week, when it is expected that
the ratification of the instrument will
take place.

Dr. Otto Bauer, the minister of social
affairs, has been ordered, announced
the Government from the Government.
He will take the leadership of the Op-
position. Today's session was presided
over by Dr. Karl Seitz, the president of
the republic.

**THIS ELECTION TO
BE COSTLY AFFAIR;
HELPING FAITHFUL****Extra Deputy Returning Offi-
cers To Be Paid.**

The provincial election is going to
cost Ontario quite a few extra thou-
sands which will find its way into the
pockets of the "faithful" in short order.
In London this amount will come to
\$870, or 67 extra deputies will be need-
ed.

It seems that under the new election
act, polling subdivisions where there
are more than 300 voters must have
an extra deputy returning officer. The
order that too much work may not
be done upon one deputy who only gets
\$10 for his day starting at nine o'clock
and finishing up at five o'clock, when
counting out the votes, makes a
difference that probably only a small
percentage of the 300 voters will be on
the job to cast votes for their favorite
candidate.

The voters' list used to be printed
in alphabetical order, which would
make it easy to cut the "A to the M's"
from the "M's to the Z's", but the gov-
ernment apparently is not so much
concerned as much as possible, has
ordered the names printed according to
the street address of the voter. The
people whose initials run from A to M
will vote in one room of the polling
station, and from M to Z in another.

**CONFERENCE ON TOWN
PLANNING POSTPONED****Will Be Held in Hamilton Last Week
of November.**

London Chamber of Commerce has
been notified of the change of date
made for the town-planning conference
to be held at the Royal Connaught
Hotel, Hamilton, and in which all of
the boards of trade and chambers of
commerce of Western Ontario are in-
terested. The original date has been
changed to Thursday, November 27, and
Friday, November 28, and it has been
necessitated because the present month
is filled up with the referendum cam-
paign and provincial election, the
national Victory Loan and the Navy
League campaign. The conference will
be the third annual convention of
Southwestern Ontario.

Many prominent speakers will ad-
dress the members of the conference,
among whom will be Lawrence Fisher,
Sir John Willison of Toronto, Hon. W.
D. Macpherson, Thomas Adams of
Ottawa, and Noulton Cauchon. Messrs.
Adams and Cauchon both visited this
city recently in connection with the
civic town-planning scheme.

The local chamber of commerce of-
ficials have been advised that the West-
ern Ontario United Boards of Trade
are supporting the aims of the con-
ference, and will send representatives to
the meeting. Fifty copies of a ques-
tionnaire to be placed before parliament-
ary candidates by the Ontario Board of
Trade were also received this morning
by Secretary Gordon Philip. The ques-
tionnaire is:

THE QUESTION.
"Having regard to the fact that
numerous municipalities in Ontario
have passed resolutions in favor of
widening the scope of the town-plann-
ing act, and in view of the fact that
they extended powers under the act
to enable them to deal effectively with
the future industrial development and
growth of cities on healthy and con-
venient lines."

**MUNITION WORKERS
WHO WENT OVERSEAS
ASKING GRATUITY****Claim They Made Big Finan-
cial Sacrifice in Going
Abroad.**

Ottawa, Oct. 16.—Plans on behalf of
munition workers who went overseas
from Canada to work in British mun-
itions factories during the war period
were made before the special commit-
tee of the House of Commons today to
establish this munition workers' civil re-
tirement fund.

D. Kirkwood and Christopher Cropley,
who represented five associa-
tions of munition workers, made their
case for the establishment of the fund.
They asked for assistance in the
form of a gratuity to make up for
the loss of wages and when they were
leaving Canada, and also that they
be placed on the same footing as mem-
bers of the B. E. F. in respect to the
soldiers' settlement scheme, or any new
scheme accepted for the re-establish-
ment of returned men.

Both witnesses told the committee
that Hon. Mr. Barnes, who held the
British labor minister which came to
Canada in 1915, had assured Canadian
workers that they would earn from
four to ten pounds per week in British
factories.

Many proceeded overseas from a
strong sense of duty, and when they
arrived they received less than £3, and
even in 1919 they had not been in-
creased. There was a stipend was a
allowance for men who left their
wives in Canada only. Owing to the
fact that the munition workers were
able to send home were insufficient,
with the result that when they re-
turned they found their families in
distress.

Mr. Cropley told of the attempts
made by the munition workers to secure
relief for these workers while they were
in Britain. The most they could secure
was a promise to pay to the munition
workers of any man who was not earn-
ing £3 per week. Mr. Cropley stated
that the men who had been in Canada
to accept this, knowing the conditions
then obtaining in British Canada.

He thought it was a pity that the
munition workers had been in Canada
and that they had been in Canada
with a lot of disgruntled men.

Mr. Kirkwood pointed out that under
the munition act, women and un-
skilled workers were making more
money than skilled men in some cases.
A man was not allowed to transfer
from one plant to another in order to
obtain higher wages.

At the close of their statements the
chairman, Hon. J. A. Calder, promised
that the case of the munition workers
would receive consideration from the
committee.

**A. R. MCMASTER GOES
TO WEST TO ASSIST
HON. W. R. MOTHERWELL****Member for Bromes Is Strongest Local
Tariff Advocate in House.**

Ottawa, Oct. 16.—A. R. McMaster,
M.P. for Bromes, leaves tonight for the
west, where he will take part in the
campaign of Hon. W. R. Motherwell,
Liberal candidate in Saskatchewan for
the pending federal by-election. It is
probable that several other members of
the Opposition will also visit the consti-
tuency of Mr. McMaster's behalf dur-
ing the coming campaign.

Mr. McMaster is one of the strongest
low tariff advocates on the Opposition
side of the House, and it was he who
sponsored the tariff resolution passed
at the recent Liberal convention.

TRAINING LIKELY TO BE
URGED BY COMMITTEE****Blanket Gratuity System Is
Not Likely To Be Recom-
mended.**

Ottawa, Oct. 16.—It is now expected
that the special committee on civil
re-establishment will be in a position
to place its report in the hands of Par-
liament by next Tuesday or Wed-
nesday.

Previous forecasts as to the contents
of this report appear likely to be well
borne out. From present indications it
appears likely that while no blanket
gratuity extension will be urged, there
is to be provision for extension of aid
to the length of the course of training
in many cases too brief to be satisfactory,
and it is said the committee will recom-
mend that the length of the course be
left to the discretion of the vocational
officers to a greater extent than heretofore,
so that half competent workmen
will not be turned out.

In regard to university students, it
is anticipated that they will be placed
in a class apart from vocationally-
trained men. It is suggested that a
long term loan may be urged to cover
their cases, with the provision that
these men will repay the Government
when they are re-established.

For the "problem cases," it is under-
stood there is a general feeling that
help to the common people and reduce
the cost of living, roads must put men
on the land, not drive them off, and
therefore the mail routes and the milk
routes to the cheese factory, to the
creamery and the city must receive
consideration.

The common people must for a long
time yet, travel and receive their food,
necessaries for the common people, from
business and factories, and the raw
material with which to manufacture
the way of the railroad. The auto and
motor truck, by competing with the
passenger, express and freight rates,
and by paralleling these roads with
highways we will only increase these
rates and will also have the cost of the
road to bear. Whether we pay by
motor tax or by direct tax matters
little.

Now if you consider you are getting
value for money expended, and could
stand a little more, well and good, but
do not forget that the consumer pays
in the end.

**DIVERGENT VIEWS MAY
BRING EARLY END TO
INDUSTRIAL MEETING****Labor and Capital Representatives Still
Uncomprehendingly Opposed.**

Washington, D. C., Oct. 16.—The fate
of the industrial conference hangs on
the outcome of the efforts of the com-
mittee of fifteen to reach an agreement
on collective bargaining, representatives
of the three groups, public, labor and
capital, declared today. Several con-
ferences said that unless both capital and
labor showed a spirit of compromise the
conference might as well announce
frankly that agreement could not be
reached and adjourn.

At the conference adjourned, resumed its
sessions early today in the hope of
completing a report for presentation to
the conference on Monday. Charles
Edward Russell of New York, authorized
spokesman of the committee, said he
feared entering the meeting today that he
"hoped" the committee would be able
to report this afternoon, but that if it
was not ready he anticipated no objec-
tion on the part of the employers to the
granting of further time for the
committee deliberations.

London, Oct. 16.—King Alfonso of
Spain is coming to England, mainly on
account of his health, which has been
a matter of concern to his physicians for
some time, according to the Mirror.

Referring to internal troubles in
Spain, which, it says, may be traced
to the growth of republicanism, this
newspaper says: "Only Alfonso's won-
derful persistence and diabolical en-
durance has saved the situation. Most
of the unrest has originated, or has
been fomented, from South American
republics."

**APPEALS TO FARMERS
FOR VEGETABLE GIFTS**

A repetition of the generous treat-
ment accorded by the farmers of this
district last year is expected by the
welfare committee of the Soldiers' Aid
Commission Saturday. On that day it
will carry on a campaign on the market
to obtain vegetables and other sup-
plies for its work during the coming
winter. These will be kept at the dis-
posal of the welfare committee and will be
distributed as need arises through-
out the year. William Moore will head
the campaign Saturday and will be as-
sisted by the Henderson Juvenile Pipe
Band.

contributed four tons of different vari-
eties of vegetables, exclusive of forty
bags of potatoes.
